HINT OF THE MONTH

I'd like to show you a little binding trick that I wished I'd known decades ago – one that will make your corners look the best that they possibly can.

Hopefully you all use the flip up, fold down, mitred corner method, as shown below. If you slip a sharp pair of small scissors under that fold, along the top of the binding, and slit that fold open, beneath it you will find a tiny triangle of fabric. This is our villain. So snip it off!! Holding your scissors vertically, snip upwards, a thread or two away from your seam-line.
