QUILTS

30" x 38" cotton batting only please

TOILETRY BAGS

Finished size 10" x 14" with a draw string, add extra to the top for the draw string casing. Does not need to be lined with fabric or be water proof

SANTA SACKS

Christmas fabric please, draw string top, add extra to the top for the draw string casing, finished sizes listed

Small - 16" high x 13" wide

Medium – 19" high x 16" wide

Large – 20" high x 20" wide

Extra Large – 24" high x 20" wide

The 29th annual Quilt Encounter was again held at the Stamford Grand Hotel in Glenelg from the 12th to the 17th September. This year saw 139 participants, with most of these coming from South Australia, but we also welcomed 16 from the NT, 2 from WA and 2 from Nth Queensland.

Unfortunately, so many of our interstate ladies cancelled due to the volatile COVID situation and State border restrictions. The NSW, ACT and VIC ladies just could not get across the State border – disappointing as just a couple of months earlier things were looking very promising for interstate travel. The tight SA border closures also involved all of our eastern states' tutors - also very disappointing!

All of these cancellations then created some "juggling" to maintain what workshops we could and create a couple of extra classes to accommodate those ladies who were attending Quilt Encounter. Thus, we were able to add an extra 2-day Mystery workshop with Faye Packham & Lessa Siegele and Kathy Horton ran an extra 2 days of the Posh Snowball class. With large numbers in Mandy Murray's 3 classes, Zoom sessions were a good option to handle these – this worked very well, with the assistance of the "Tech" people at the Stamford Grand. Gina Burgess also stepped in to help out at very short notice and was able to take Deborah Louie's Bouquet of Flowers 2-day workshop. Huge "thanks" to Deb for sharing this workshop with Gina, so that we could continue that class.

The Committee would also like to acknowledge and thank all of the participants who had their classes changed around at short notice. We understand that having purchased supplies and "prepped" for workshops that we could no longer run, it was quite an adjustment to then re-organize for alternative classes. These ladies all adapted and understood this "juggling game" was the only option to keep the event going so that they were able to enjoy their time at the Stamford Grand, with the fun and comradery that is QE.





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Our 2 South Australian Scholarship ladies were able to join us this year too. Margie from Kangaroo Island & Janelle from Lobethal enjoyed their first experiences of QE after enduring extremely tough times in the aftermath of our January 2020 fires. The companionship of like-minded ladies and their stay at the Grand for some "me" time was appreciated – their smiles said it all!

The shops that joined us at the Stamford Grand again provided beautiful displays with plenty of choice for participants to purchase for their classes or to add to their "stash". HEATHER'S TOOLS AND TIPS

Cutting mats, rotary cutters and blades. Look for those labelled rotary cutting mats which are made of a soft compound material so are much kinder to your rotary cutting blades. Mats do need looking after and the occasional light spray with water for hydration. Cutters of preference are the ergonomic ones with retractable blades which prevent accidents and are kinder to your hands. Blades need to be the best that you can afford for a longer lifetime.

FEATURED QUILTER: JEANNE TRELEAVYN

I came to Australia from Maine, USA to work as a radiographer at the Adelaide Children's Hospital in1970. A blind date found me marrying an Aussie and living in Boston for 18 months. We chose to return to Adelaide in1973 and this has been HOME ever since. A wonderful city to raise two children, a boy and a girl who are now 43 and 41 respectively. This is Home, and I have never regretted the move.

Any craft relating to my younger Maine years comprised of knitting andcrocheting having been taught these skills by my mother. It was only once I was at home raising kids that my creative urge intensified, sewing Cabbage Patch clothes and some clothes for the kids and myself. But if they looked home made or didn't fit, I threw them out, as I didn't have the skills to adjustwhat needed adjusting. Self taught sewing skills were the norm.

A TAFE Certificate in Spinning and Wool Knowledge at Marleston propelled me toward completing a Diploma in Applied and Visual Arts majoring in Photography at the North Adelaide School of Art. Searching for design ideas through a camera lens provided me with visuals to then interpret into woven tapestries. Fibre and textiles have always been at the core of my creativity but making fabric seemed too complex and time consuming. Fast forward ten years and this found me no longer weaving butheavily into sewing with bought fabrics, creating quilted art pieces and a fewusable quilts. I am in awe of all the beautiful traditional patterns, and enjoy experimenting with their basic elements. Bright colours are my palette and curves my latest infatuation.

I began using Instagram about six years ago and became an Individual member of the Modern Quilt Guild at that time. This has provided me with the inspiration I was craving, as I had drained the local Quild's library. The Modern Movement's vitality and teaching base is addictive. Associated Social media availability is providing me with an over abundance of ideas and visual access to wonderful artists from around the world. Workshops and webinars are always on my radar, and despite the last eighteen months,I have been able to continue experimenting and have finished quite a few projects, three of which were juried into Quiltcon Together 2021.

I have been inspired to create in many ways and love Log Cabin, Foundation Paper Piecing, Needle Turn Applique and Reverse Applique. I have tried entering various competitions, the first of which was the 'Curated Quilts' mini challenges that have a theme and a colour pallet and are set every four months. These restrictions force you to use colours and shapes that may not be your favourite. I was fortunate to have been included in threeeditions of the magazine-'Triangle', 'Houses' and 'Curves'.







FEATURED QUILTER: JEANNE TRELEAVYN



As my quilts are mainly Art quilts, my goal was to eventually be juried into the MQG's Quiltcon exhibitions. I was so excited to have onreaccepted in 2019, two in 2020 and three in 2021!

I then took a punt and applied for entry in the Schweinfurth Biennial "Quilt=Art=Quilt" 2019 exhibition in Auburn, NY. Low and behold, I got in! I was shocked, to say the least!







My latest surprise was to be included in the MQG's Showcase inHouston this year and will automatically be juried into Quiltcon 2022.

I continue to take online workshops to learn new skills. My favourite quiltartists are Irene Roderick, Maria Shell, Sarah Bond, Lucy Engels, Victoria Gertenbach and Jenny Haynes(aka Pappersaxsten) whose templates havebeen my Drunkards Path Inspiration and Obsession.

OUR ROVING REPORTERS DROP IN ON FAYE PACKHAM

1000 and still counting.....

'Charity begins at home' is an old saying that promotes that we should first focus on those who are closest to us then go out and help others. Charity not only means financial support, but also refers to love, compassion, care and other peoples' feelings and sense of importance.

So, what do you do when your family don't need the beautiful quilts you make anymore?

You still make them and give them to charity.

About 3 ½ years ago my husband Kym suggested I contact Otto (my local Bernina Dealer) and see if he had a second hand long arm quilting machine for sale. He did and so a Bernina 830 with the computer program and 10 foot frame came to live in my front lounge room. Four months on and having quilted 75 charity quilts with edge to edge designs I was hooked - hook, line and sinker!

AMQF (Australian Machine Quilting Festival) came to town and again with the support of Kym a brand new Grace Q'nique 21" throat long arm machine came home with me. I was able to sell the 830 and frame as Knowing I am helping others has given me so much I couldn't fit both machines into my life or house for that matter.

As most people know I am a member of the Claytons Committee who have been raising money through quilting for many years. Firstly for Ashford Special School where my daughter Lauren was a student,

then Pasadena High School and now Bedford Group. Bedford changes lives by empowering people with disability with the freedom to be, through meaningful employment and supports. Lauren has worked at Bedford for 18 years.

Since 2008 the Claytons Committee have raised over \$300,000 for Bedford by selling \$50 mystery quilt kits and have travelled all over South Australia teaching workshop at various country groups.

Now back to the charity quilts.....

The wonderful Claytons Committee have made several hundred quilt tops and my dear friend Trish Douglas from Millicent has also contributed over 100 herself. I have guilted over 1000 guilts on my Lady Grace machine and these quilts have all been donated to several different charities including Royal Adelaide Hospital, Queen Elizabeth Hospital Palliative Care unit, Margaret Tobin at Flinders Medical Centre, and Lyell McEwan Hospital to name a few.

(I do not need any more donations of quilt tops, thank you!)

OUR GROUP – Founded in 1985. These gatherings were attended by a dozen keen ladies in the Kadina Anglican Church Hall. We were there for several years with a decision made to corporate with the SA Quilters' Guild. We then moved to the Supper Room in the Kadina Town Hall as members numbers grew. This space was then refurbished by the Council making it not suitable for quilting so we moved to the Moonta Town Hall Supper room with a glowing membership and more accessories and we outgrew that space too.

Following a meeting with the then Mayor we were offered the use of the derelict Wallaroo Mines Institute which had fallen into disrepair after the previous tenants had no further interest in it.



As seems to happen to unused premises, windows had been broken and the premises invaded by pigeons but no interior vandalism. Hand Bowls, sink and toilets were full of excrement, dead birds and nests, as were every corner. Our first inspection was greeted by many very live birds flying around us. Undeterred the Council were prepared to restore this lovely solid old heritage building if we were interested in a Tenancy Agreement. We couldn't believe our good fortune, and as they say the rest is history. About 2 years later we moved in and we are very proud of what has been achieved by our Copper Coast Council and our members to make it the admirable home we have.

We have been able to set up one room as a Gallery where we can display quilts which were part of an exchange programme with 2 groups in Cornwall and hangings which have been made to commemorate special occasions ie. SA's Secquicentary: 100 years of Women in Agriculture: the reopening of the hall for the quilters and several others.

Having exclusive use of the hall we are able to accommodate members any day of the week to fit around work commitments etc.; our membership has grown to about 55 including 7 life members who have shown extreme service to the group for many years.

We hold several internal workshops a year tutored by our own talented members plus try to host one professional per year. Our "Gifting" volunteers make and donate approximately 50 bed quilts to local charities, 50 cot quilts to Rose Ward at the Women's and Children's Hospital, isolette covers etc. Each exhibition we make and donate a "Raffle" quilt for one of the local Hospitals or Retirement Villages. We are of course very grateful for any unused fabrics which are donated for use.
