



Festive Dip Recipe

The recipe is from the Thermomix Everyday cookbook but can be made using any mixer.

CAPSICUM AND SUNDRIED TOMATO DIP

INGREDIENTS

1 garlic clove

100g sun-dried or semi-sundries tomatoes, drained

1/2 red capsicum, deseeded and roughly chopped

120g unsalted cashews

20g olive oil

2tsp white vinegar

30g parmesan cheese, cut into cubes

METHOD

Place all ingredients into mixing bowl and press briefly 5 times/1 sec/turbo or until roughly but evenly chopped consistency

Serve straight away or refrigerate until ready to use .


Flinders Kids

Heather's Tips and Tools

Marking pens

Heather divides her marking pens into two categories – those which are dry and sit on the fabric surface, and those which are a chemical and soak into fabric.

It is a very good idea to test any pen on a scrap of the fabric being used in your quilt top. This will help to know if it is clear enough to see, how easy it is to use and how easy it is to remove (and how to do that too.)

Heather's favourites are a ceramic marker (Sewline), a regular mechanical lead pencil, a chalk marker (Clover) and a chemical pen. (Frixion)

She does not own blue wash out or purple fade out pens, but they may suit your purpose.

Rachelle has been involved with Back Packs 4 SA Kids for a number of years. She presented a slide show which set out the establishment and activities of this charity. <u>Backpacks 4 SA Kids</u> is their website and there is a wealth of information to read there.

Sadly, there is a huge need for help for families undergoing life changing events, which can have a great impact on them, especially the children, who may be removed from their homes with only the clothes they are wearing.

In addition to backpacks, the charity distributes Home Starter packs for those who have to begin again, Anchor packs for 12–25-year-olds who are experiencing homelessness and a Christmas program to help 0-18 year-olds entering care.

Nola suggested we pass the hat around and \$1375 was raised. Thank you everyone, for your help.



Suzanne Gummow - Wonky Houses

Have you ever wanted to create your very own original wonky houses? If so this workshop is for you! You will create wonky houses using bright, earthy or paler fabrics using fusing techniques. This is a creative approach that will enhance your art quilts.

Each person will end up with a small individual piece of work. Your work will be approximately A3 size. Stitching may happen (depending on time) and discussion will occur about how to add stitch and embellishments to enhance your designs. Some of the techniques covered in this workshop will be basic design, raw edge applique, free machine embroidery/quilting and finishing techniques that will be required for your special fabric collage work.

Pam Holland - Just Look At That Jetty

Three-day Workshop

Designed and taught for the first time at *Quilt Encounter 2021* this pictorial quilt of the Glenelg Jetty workshop is back by popular demand. A morning visit with Quilter Jan Murfitt

Kathy and Chris recently had the pleasure of dropping in on one of the Guild's newest members -Jan Murfitt - and spent a delightful morning with her. We asked Jan to share some of her story with us all, so hope that you too will enjoy getting to know a little more about her.

Jan's Story:

When I was 14 years old I had my left eye removed because I had a detached retina. That didn't stop me at 16 learning how to drive a car! I always loved doing craft work and started ceramic classes with my Mum and sister. Later on I learnt how to do lead lighting and scrapbooking.

I started quilting after seeing my cousin's daughter sewing. She was amazing and I loved all the cotton fabrics that you could buy in the little quilting shops around Adelaide. The fabrics reminded me of the beautiful papers that I had used In my scrapbooking. I started seriously quilting in 2003 after my husband died of cancer at 52 and I needed a hobby to keep me occupied. I retired early from work, and with my mother's old Janome sewing machine that she no longer used, I went to classes at Hettie's Patch once a week and was hooked. My first teacher was Kate Wright, a Guild member, and she taught me so much back then.


In 2011 I found out that I had breast cancer after not having had a mammogram for 7 years. I had been too busy looking after Mum, who was beginning to get forgetful and I also had my first grand-daughter to look after while my daughter worked full time. I ended up having both breasts removed and that day my mother passed away in a nursing home with dementia. I commenced chemo and radiation therapy and when my hair grew back I joined a group of ladies at a local quilt shop at Semaphore, rekindling my interest in quilting and buying myself a new Janome sewing machine. We met at the local Community Centre and called ourselves the Warm Harts. I've remained friends with all the ladies from that time till this day.

I do have trouble sometimes threading a needle, but I suspect that a lot of other quilters experience the frustration of poor eyesight too.

I enjoy making tote bags to put quilts into - I give most of my quilts away to friends, family and, of course, the new babies in my life. I don't see any use in keeping them in a cupboard and not using them.

There were four of the five inaugural members with us, with about twenty current members. An eleventh life membership was awarded to Kylie Duncan.


Our group continues to be enthusiastic quilters, and meets fortnightly.

Dare to Differ Exhibition 2022 - Conditions of Entry

This is a selected exhibition of contemporary quilts to be held at Gallery M, Marion, South Australia 2 – 22 September 2022.

It asks entrants to 'Dare to Differ' in their approach to their work – perhaps in theme, style, technique, materials, or even colour. It gives artists a chance to challenge themselves to unleash their creativity.

- 1. Entry is open to all quilters resident in Australia
- 2. Online entries are open from May 1 until June 16, 2022 via the QGSA website.
- 3. All work must be innovative and original not a copy or a variation of another artist's work, not traditional and not from a class or a workshop, and must meet the criteria of 'daring to differ'.
- 4. The work must possess the basic structural characteristics of a quilt and must be predominantly fibre comprised of at least 2 layers stitched together. It must not be framed or stretched on stretcher bars.
- 5. Size no more than 2.5 metres in either direction (L x H), with a maximum depth of 10cm from the wall
- 6. All entries must have been completed in the 2 years prior to the exhibition. Entries may have been previously exhibited.
- 7. A non-refundable entry fee of \$35 for up to two entries is required.
- 8. Selections will be made from **high resolution JPEG digital images** via online entry. Entrants must submit **2 images** for each work, one showing the overall piece and one detail photograph.

 All photos should be labelled with the quilt title and entrant's name:

<Artist's Surname Name Initial-QuiltName-Full/Detail>

eg. <GummowS-flowers-Full.jpg>

- 9. An Artist's statement of up to 30 words is required by the selectors and for the catalogue for each entry. This should be written in the third person and indicate the inspiration behind the art, rather than describe the techniques.
- 10. The selectors' decision is final, and no correspondence will be entered into. Acceptance of an entry does not automatically guarantee display.
- 11. Selected entries must be received by the Convenor between Monday 1st and Monday 15th August 2022
- 12. Delivery and return instructions will be advised on acceptance of the entry. Selected artists will be responsible for postage and insurance to and from Dare to Differ.
- 13. Quilts may be for sale. The Gallery will retain a 33% (includes GST) commission on each work sold during the exhibition.
- 14. The Quilters' Guild of SA Inc reserves the right to photograph the quilts for Guild archives and other appropriate purposes.
