VALE - JOSIE FRADD



It is with sadness that we farewell Josie Fradd, a long-time Guild member. Josie would have been 94 years of age on 1st February 2022.

Josie started patchwork and quilting in June 1985, attending Lynne Zak's Basic Patchwork course. She joined the Guild that year after seeing the first exhibition at Unley Town Hall, and she became the Guild's first tea lady. In the next years Josie became Membership Secretary and then President from 1987 to 1989. Josie was made a Life Member of the Guild in 1994.

When she was organising one of the early exhibitions, she was named Mother Superior in recognition of her dedication and hard work.

A report in a 2010 issue of Patches told of Josie giving a talk about her quilting journey, the many friendships she had made and the techniques and skills she had learned. Her best-known skills were hand needle-turn applique and hand quilting. She spoke of the quilts that were made and exchanged with quilters from Austin, Texas, Adelaide's sister city. Josie was in her 80s by this time and she spoke from memory, having left her notes in her handbag!

Josie leaves her daughter, Judith, and son, Philip, six grandchildren and six great grandchildren. She will be greatly missed by her family and the many friends she made over the years.

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Jenny Bowker talk

On 23 February quilter **Jennifer Bowker** will present a talk in Adelaide for the *Australian Decorative and Fine Arts Society* (ADFAS).

Jenny's talk is entitled **Egypt from the Tent-maker's Khan to the City of the Dead** and is open to the public. Advance bookings are required; tickets are \$25.00 and may be purchased via the ADFAS Secretary Margaret Stableford on 0407 070 722.

Jenny Bowker was born in Australia and has an Arts Degree (Visual) from Australian National University, Canberra. She has been quilting since 1997 and is an internationally known and awarded quilter. Jenny has worked with women's groups in Iran, Palestine and in many other developing countries as well as teaching widely in Europe, Asia and USA. She is also known for her work with the Egyptian Tentmakers working with mostly men.

In 2018 Jenny was given the award of Officer of the Order of Australia for distinguished service to Australia-Middle East cultural relations. In her Adelaide lecture, Jenny takes you on a journey through some of the lesser known textile traditions of Egypt, including patchwork projects with the wives and daughters in the City of the Dead, the women embroiderers of Akmeem and the Tentmakers of Old Cairo and their beautiful applique.

SEEKING HELP TO FIND A QUILT

Dear President,

I am researching - and writing a story about - the Mellor family who migrated to South Australia in 1838 and 1840. Somewhere I heard that Hannah's quilt made in Yorkshire when she was 18 around 1826 - with her initials and date stitched in - had been given to a society or museum by her descendants. I can no longer find this reference and yet would love to include a photo of the quilt she made. Is there any way your society would know where it might have been sent?

I am a descendant of Hannah's youngest sister, Delia who married Daniel George Brock, one of the adventurers who accompanied Capt. Sturt on his last expedition - and I live in London, England. Other descendants of Hannah's parents might carry the Fisher name, Turner, Walker, Mellor - the Brock men died out in 1940 when the only surviving boy carrying that name was killed in a motor bike accident after he'd joined the army. But of course - with lots of girls in the family - many descendants are not easily named.



SEWING MACHINE TABLE MAT WITH POCKETS

Heather Ford ©

Finished size of mat - 20" wide x 16" top to bottom. Adjust this measurement to the size of your machine.

REQUIREMENTS

50cm main fabric
50cm contrast fabric
50cm wadding or 640 iron-on pellon
2 (WOF x 3½") strips for binding
20" of 1" bias binding (optional decoration for top of pocket)

CUTTING

Cut 1 (20" x 16") main fabric – front of mat Cut 1 (20" x 16") contrast fabric – back of mat Cut 1 (20" x 16") pellon Cut 1 (20" x 12") contrast fabric – pocket

CONSTRUCTION

- Sandwich the main, pellon and contrast fabric as for a quilt and quilt as desired. I quilted a 2" grid.
- Fold the pocket piece in half, wrong sides together, along the long side
- Bind the top folded edge of the pocket with the bias binding or top stitch close to the fold.
- After quilting the main/pellon/contrast, lay the pocket onto the right side of the main fabric, lining up the raw edges of the pocket with the sides and base of the main mat piece. Stay stitch the pocket in place by zigzagging all the way around the raw edge of the mat.
- Create pockets for the items you wish to have to hand by drawing lines parallel to the sides of
 the mat from the top of the pocket to the base and then stitching on the lines. Stitch a "T" at
 the top of this line to give extra strength to the pocket top. You may wish to create shorter
 pockets for smaller items by stitching across the width of the pocket several inches from the
 base of the mat.
- Join the 2 binding strips together and press as for a quilt binding. Then bind the mat as for a
 quilt BUT attach the binding to the BACK of the mat, fold the binding to the front and machine
 stitch the binding down.

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REQUIREMENTS

50cm main fabric 45cm lining fabric 45cm of 640 iron on pellon

CUTTING

Main Fabric

cut one rectangle 17" x 18"
cut one 1¼" x WOF strip for binding
cut one 1½" x WOF strip for tie
cut one 2" x 16" rectangle for binding for top edge of pockets

Lining

cut one 17" x 18" rectangle

Pellon

cut one 17x 18" rectangle

CONSTRUCTION

- Iron the main fabric rectangle wrong side to the pellon.
- Drawing the quilting lines. On the right side of the main fabric draw a line running parallel to the 18" sides down the centre. Then draw lines at 1" intervals on either side of this line. You should now have 17 lines drawn parallel with the 18" side of the rectangle.
- * Pin the lining rectangle to the other side of the pellon and quilt along the quilting lines drawn on the main fabric, through all thicknesses.
- * Trim the quilted rectangle back so the 18" sides now measure 17" and the 17" sides measure 16". You should be trimming just along the edge of the outside quilted lines. Cut a slight curve at the top corners of one end of the rectangle. Zigzag around the outside edges of the rectangle.
- * Using the 2" x 16" binding piece, bind the 16" straight edge of the rectangle. Sew the binding right side together with the lining and ½" from the edge. Fold the binding to the right side, fold under ½" and top stitch near the folded edge to secure it down.
- * Fold the bottom edge of the rectangle up so the bound edge is $4\frac{1}{2}$ " up from the fold, lining up the quilting lines, lining fabric inside main fabric outside, to form the pen pockets.
- * Create the pockets by stitching along the quilting lines, back stitch at both ends of these seams. Create two 2" pockets at the outer sides by not stitching over the quilting lines 1" in from the edge. Stay stitch right on the edge to hold the pocket in place to make it easier when binding the outer edge.
- * Using the 1¼" WOF binding strip bind the raw outer edges of the three sides of the pencil roll. Do as for a single fold quilt binding, neatening the start and finish.
- Use the 1½" WOF fabric strip to make a tie. Fold in half along the long side, right sides together and stitch. Turn right sides out and press. Make a knot in each end to neaten. Find the half way point and stitch in place along the outer edge of the roll about 5" from the bottom of the pockets.
- * Fold the top curved edge down about 3" so the pencils stay in place.

FABRIC REQUIREMENTS

This isn't a large quilt, or an overly complex quilt, at around 51 inches square. That said, it is block based and very easily made larger in both width and length by making additional blocks once you have made the initial mystery ones.

Pieced or plain borders can also be added later.

This quilt relies heavily on STRONG contrast between your background fabric and the block design fabrics. Think dark/light, brights/lights, brights/darks.

As a starting point, and a guide to fabric choice in a mystery quilt situation, consider this a 3 fabric quilt....

~ all three fabrics need to play nicely together yet stand apart from each other. Pick a neutral colour for your background. Fabric One could be a busy/interesting fabric.

Fabric Two would be considered your highlight or zinger fabric, one that adds a focus to your block design. Perhaps use a plain, grunge style or other tone on tone fabric.

- ~ Want to use up some of your scrap collection or use a set of designer fabrics? You can! The background could be neutral scrappy fabrics, used at random. Fabric One could be scrappy fabrics but I suggest that they have a similar colour value i.e., all mediums, brights, medium-darks or darks. They need to contrast with both your background and your Fabric Two zinger fabric.
- ~ Just to throw the cat amongst the pigeons, and this will be how I plan to make my second quilt.....this quilt will look stunning as a two colour quilt. Fabric One and Fabric Two will be the same fabric. Think blue/white, red/white, bright/black, child's print/background..
- ~ Reproduction fabrics would work well too as either a two or three colour quilt.

BACKGROUND FABRIC: 2.3 metres
FABRIC ONE: 1.2 metres
FABRIC TWO: 0.5 metres



QGSA 2022 OMICRON MYSTERY QUILT

CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS

As you cut your fabric, place pieces in labelled bags as indicated.

BACKGROUND FABRIC:

- 1. Cut 2 squares 19" x 19".
- 2. Cut 2 squares 9.5" x 9.5".
- 3. From the remaining width of fabric (WOF) from step 2, cut 3 @ 2" strips. Sub-cut these strips to create 36 @ 2" squares. LABEL 'D' Sub-cut the remaining strip(s) into approx. 24 @ 2" squares to add to Step 4.
- 4. Cut 3 @ 2" WOF strips. Sub-cut for a total of 72 @ 2" squares from left-over Step 3s plus Step 4s. LABEL 'C/D'
- 5. Cut 1 @ 3.5" WOF strip. Sub-cut to 9 @ 3.5" squares. LABEL 'F'
- 6. Cut 2 @ 3 7/8" WOF strips. Sub-cut to 18 @ 3 7/8" squares. LABEL 'A'
- 7. Cut 5 @ 2 5/8" WOF strips and sub-cut to 72 @ 2 5/8" squares. LABEL 'E'
- 8. Cut 2 (you may need 3, depending on the width of your fabric) @ 5" WOF strips. Sub-cut into 16 @ 5" squares. LABEL 'G'
- 9. Cut 2 (you may need a 3rd one later, depending on the width of your fabric, but just cut 2 for now) @ 1.5" WOF strips. LABEL 'S1'

FABRIC ONE:

- 1. Cut 2 WOF strips @ 3.5". Sub-cut to 36 @ 3.5" x 2" rectangles. LABEL 'B/C'
- 2. Cut 2 WOF strips @2". Sub-cut to 36 @ 2" squares. LABEL 'D'
- 3. Cut 2 WOF strips @ 4 3/16". This is a smidgeon under ¼" mark. Sub-cut to 9 @ 4 3/16" squares. LABEL 'C'
- 4. Cut 5 WOF strips @ 2 3/8". Sub-cut to 72 @ 2 3/8" squares. LABEL 'B'
- 5. Cut 1 WOF strip @ 3.5". Sub-cut to 4 @ 3.5" squares. LABEL 'H'
- 6. Cut 4 @ 1.5" WOF strips. You may need a 5th one later. LABEL 'S2'


FABRIC TWO: the Zinger!

- 1. Cut 1 WOF strip @ 4 3/16". Sub-cut to 9 @ 4 3/16" squares. LABEL 'C2'
- 2. Cut 2 WOF strips @ 2 3/8". Sub-cut to 36 @ 2 3/8" squares. LABEL 'B2'

PLEASE NOTE: You will likely have some fabric left over. I design my quilts in EQ8 and their fabric yardage recommendations are usually on the generous side. Additionally, there was allowance built in for extra strips should individual WOFs not be 40+" wide.


QGSA 2022 OMICRON MYSTERY QUILT

CONSTRUCTION: PART ONE

- **1.** Take 36 of your 72 Fabric One 'B' squares and cut in half diagonally to create 72 half square triangles.
- **2.** To your 36 @ 'D' 2" Background squares, add triangles as shown.



- **3.** Press seams towards the darker fabric. Trim off any dog ears.
- **4.** Take your 18 @ 3 7/8" Background Fabric squares **LABELLED** 'A' and cut in half diagonally to create 36 half square triangles.
- **5.** Add these large triangles to the triangle unit created in Step 2.

Pressing these units may present a bit of a challenge for some of you. Here's why. Ideally the seam allowance would be pressed towards the larger, plain triangle to ease any bulkiness along the seam, particularly at the junction point of the pieced, large triangle.

For me, having a very light background fabric, this would have created an undesirable shadowing. However, pressing towards the pieced triangle results in too much bulk at the junction point and the potential for the seam to distort.

To help minimise any distortion/bulkiness, I find it useful to scoop a small, curved piece out of the seam allowances at that centre point.

Trim off any dog ears.

You should now have 36 UNIT A pieces.

Trimmed seam allowance at the junction point.



UNIT A 3.5" square




QGSA 2022 OMICRON MYSTERY QUILT

CONSTRUCTION PART TWO



- 1. You will need your 36 @ 3.5" x 2" Fabric One rectangles (labelled B/C) and your 72 @ 2" Background Fabric squares (labelled C/D) for this step.
- 2. You may choose to lightly mark the diagonal on the wrong side of each one each of your 2" Background Fabric squares, but the method I use is to align painter's tape to my machine base to mark the path of my needle. I then use the tape as a guide in feeding through my fabric. Note that on my extended table this taped line is just left of their designated centre line, so it may be worth double checking any third-party that you use for accuracy.

- 4. There is an interesting conundrum when it comes to pressing these units. If you wish to (as I did) avoid having seam shadowing on your lighter fabric then both seams would be pressed inwards. However, this creates a greater challenge if one needs to match this seam junction with another during later construction, as the point is a little harder to identify. It also makes this a bulkier seam intersection. A compromise is to press one seam inwards, and one outwards. The photo above left shows both options.

 Wherever possible though, press both seams outwards if your fabric choices permit, as this is the preferred option in terms of both bulk and any later seam matching.
- 5. Take your 2 @ 1.5" Background Fabric strips (labelled S1) and 4 @ 1.5" Fabric One strips (labelled S2) and create width-of-fabric strata units as shown on the right.
- 6. Press seams towards the darker fabric. Sub-cut into 5" lengths.

 Depending on the width of your fabric, you may need to cut more strips, or to use scrap 5-6"length pieces to create the required 16 units.
