In 2021 Mary distributed 124 quilts to various organisations throughout Adelaide. If Southern Comforters is to continue we are looking for someone, a couple of people but preferably a group to take over the co-ordination of this Guild sub-committee. It does not have to be one of our established groups but could be a group of friends who would like to be involved. There might be a couple who would co-ordinate the group and others who would just like to help out. If you would like to help or need more information please contact me. On behalf of us all I offer Mary and Kay heartfelt thanks for a mammoth effort over many years.

Now we are back in business our teams are full steam ahead planning functions and meetings for you to attend and I look forward to seeing you as we move forward in 2022.

## Comfort Ability Quilts

I wonder if you might pass on our enormous thanks from the chronic pain team for the quilts we recently received for our Comfort Ability Group. I suspect that you will not be surprised to hear that they were so appreciated, welcomed and valued by the young people who attended and they provided such a snuggly session to practice skills such as graded relaxation, guided imagery and mindfulness.

I wonder if your quilters know that 1 in 4 young people experience chronic pain and this significantly impacts their ability to go to school and learn, to see friends, to participate in family activities and to sleep. There are many chronic pain conditions including: juvenile arthritis; endometriosis; chronic musculoskeletal pain; functional abdominal pain; irritable bowel disease; migraine headaches; ehlers danlos; complex regional pain syndrome; fibromyalgia; neuropathic pain; post-concussion headache; post-surgery pain and sickle cell anaemia to name a few of the conditions that our young people experience who have successfully benefitted from the program. Sometimes our young people also have significant mental health distress and about $70 \%$ of the young people referred to our service experience anxiety and depression.

The Women's and Children's Hospital is the first hospital in Australia to run the Comfort Ability day and it has recently been implemented at Perth Children's Hospital and Queensland Paediatric Hospital. It is such a fabulous program that is run throughout the US and Canada and I am aware that other sites are very envious of our implementation of the blankets and would like to echo this wonderful addition to their practice. The program is focused on teaching young people important skills for how they can better manage their pain and for young people to be able to take the blanket home, it provides them with an incredible comfort reminder that supports their practice of the skills learned once they are home.

Thank you again and we are extremely grateful for the hard work and time spent in creating these wonderful quilts and do hope we can continue this collaboration in support of the Comfort Ability program.

Cindy Massey is the queen of scraps and creates brilliant quilts and bags from her collection of donated and acquired fabric bits. Wendy Whellum has made traditional quilts, creating patterns from just pictures, and has made and taught a huge variety of styles of quilts. Zara Zannettino has recently experienced every "mother's pride and joy" by seeing her "quiltbabies" do more travel than her this year! By following the Call for Entry prompts from her valued associations with Studio Art Quilt Association (SAQA) and Oz Quilt Network (OZQN), she has had several quilts selected as finalists in assorted international exhibitions. We will be privileged to see examples of her evolving free-style textile and thread collages, that utilise her intuitive play with artisanal fabrics and are informed by her love of nature photography and her life experience.

This week Zara was awarded a prize in the $13^{\text {th }}$ Solar Art Prize by the Royal South Australian Society of Arts with her triptych of quilts "Absurd Birds" (one pictured). They were also just announced as a finalist in the $23^{\text {rd }}$ annual "Quilt Visions 2022" competition. Awards will be announced at the Visions Art Museum, a leading contemporary art museum in San Diego, California, from $15^{\text {th }}$ October to $31^{\text {st }}$ December this year.


Her framed quilt "In the Eye of the Beholder" (pictured left), has just returned from the Pacific Northwest Quilt and Fiber Arts Museum in Washington State, USA. Exhibition. It will also be featured in a book on textile depictions of birds by Martha Sielman and Schaeffer Publishing.

Zara's quilt "The Invisible Connection" also premiered in SAQA's "Microscape" exhibition at the International Quilt Festival, Houston, Texas. This USA organization's focus is to promote art quilts and boasts over 4,000 artists, curators, collectors and art professionals from around the world. This quilt will continue travelling globally into 2024.

## ~ SALLY PLUMMER'S STORY ~

Once upon a time I saw an article for starting a Quilting group in Adelaide. Now I enjoy following the amazing work of the SA Quilters' Guild on Facebook and - perhaps a bit foolishly - I agreed to write about the early days.

Foolishly, as my memory recalls snapshots of life and the emotions that went with them. So forgive me if I have forgotten some of the pioneers' names and the sequence of events. Many thanks to my great friend and SAQG member, Cathy Edmonds, who has helped remind me of these happy times.

It must have been the early 1980s that I went to the first official meeting. I recall Rachel Dettman wowing me with a fabulous quilt. Elaine Gardner and Rachel had advertised the meeting. 29 people turned up and 19 people, including myself, signed up for the committee.

It was a very positive, enthusiastic group, with a lot of talent - Lessa Siegele, the late Margaret Russell, Anthea Martin, Robyn Messner (she had a quilting shop and I still have one of her publications), Lyn Zac, Wendy Bowe, and Una Lawson, and it seemed to grow rapidly.
We met in the Arts Council building on South Terrace, handy for me as I lived in Eastwood. There was a long, board table, and I used to walk my lurcher (staghound), Bella, to some meetings where she would lie under the table and go to sleep. She was so quiet that some people got a bit of a turn at the end when a large dog appeared!

Not sure how much use I was - I'd been in a Government Department for 5 or 6 years in early 1980s, and had a great job. The work was about organisational and individual change, so maybe I was more use on the set-up and admin side.

At this point I should make a confession - I've never made a full-sized quilt. My love was making quilted clothes. Friends would give their favourite old clothes and I'd make them a jacket. The serenity of stitching is so enjoyable, but once an item is finished, it's over, gone - on to the next one - so l love someone else to enjoy it.

Quilting was partly responsible for my departure from Australia. In 1986 my beloved Abyssinian cat died of old age and I was looking for a new job. Returning from an evening out with my then partner, he asked me - not in a good way - why l'd worn "that handmade jacket." Hmm. Making a dramatic change needs several reasons and in my early 40s I decided
 to go back to the UK, where my parents were in their seventies. Not an easy transition, leaving many good friends behind. However with making new friends, starting a business, founding a charity in Zimbabwe (Hippo Pools Trust), and a wonderful husband, life here is good.

I dabble now in all sorts of textile crafts from beadwork to rust dyeing, 3D animals to tapestry wall hangings. Still quilting, but in different ways - but not a full-sized quilt yet!

Here are a few examples - Bella (a Walk on the Shore) was a beading project where everyone else in our group made pretty bracelets! Bella is imagined on Largs beach, and the photo appeared in the book our Minerva Beaders group published in 2010. To our surprise it sold over 2000 copies and financed building new classrooms in a remote rural school in Zimbabwe.

The Queen's Rhinoceros is after the wonderful Albrecht Durer's famous rhinoceros. It's pale pink silk with trapunto, quilting, beadwork. The beast has broken from its golden chain and is roaming the forest. This has happened before and she has a chain with bells round her neck so hopefully she will be recaptured soon.

The Carrion Crow is quilted satin ribbon over a padded wire armature, with a beaded eye. The beak is metal and a bit chewed by litters of Abyssinian kittens.

Heather had some 'out of the ordinary' rulers to show us.

* 10-inch square - handy for layer cakes
* $\quad 5 \times 15$-inch rectangle - half layer cake and diagonals cutting
* 8-inch X 14-inch
* 2.5-inch X 8-inch and 6-inch
* 1-inch X 5.inch and 6-inch
* $1 / 2$-inch wide - useful for marking $1 / 4$-inch seam allowance

## MACHINE NEEDLE FOLDER

by Heather Ford
$1 / 411$ seam allowance throughout

## REQUIREMENTS

50 cm main fabric
25 cm lining fabric
25 cm 630 or 640 iron on pellon
90 cm ribbon for tie
25 cm clear plastic for pockets or a piece $12^{\prime \prime} \times 71 / 2^{\prime \prime}$

$1.40 \mathrm{~m} \times 1^{\prime \prime}$ wide bias binding (I used striped bias binding which looks great)

Thread for quilting and constructing the folder

## CONSTRUCTION

- Cut a $20^{\prime \prime} \times 8^{\prime \prime}$ piece of main fabric, lining fabric and pellon
- Fuse the pellon to the wrong side of the main fabric and pin the lining fabric wrong side to the back of the pellon
- Quilt as desired, (I grid quilted on the diagonal.) Then cut back to measure $20^{\prime \prime} \times 71 /{ }^{\prime \prime}$ and zigzag the raw edge
- From the plastic cut 4 pockets $3 " \times 71 /{ }^{\prime \prime}$. Using the bias binding, bind both long edges of three pockets and one long edge of the fourth pocket.
- Draw a line across the quilted main folder piece at the $5 ", 10^{\prime \prime}$ and $15^{\prime \prime}$ points of the length. This is the placement line for the base of the pockets. Pin the pocket with only one bound edge at one end of the quilted piece, the unbound edge of the pocket level with the end of the main quilted piece, and the other 3 pockets along the drawn lines. Stitch the pockets in place along their bases and stay stitch in place at the sides. Stitch both edges of the binding (for strength) on the three pockets which will not be sewn into the binding of the folder.
- On the pockets measure in $2 \frac{1}{2}$ " from both sides of the main folder piece. Stitch a line parallel to the edge of the folder to form three small pockets from each pocket piece. Back stitch at both ends of this stitching
- From the main fabric construct a $11 / 4^{\prime \prime} \times 65^{\prime \prime}$ singe fold binding. Stitch the binding to the pocket side of the needle folder, ( $1 / 4$ " seam allowance,) fold the binding to the outside of the needle folder, fold the raw edge under and invisibly hand stitch the folded edge of the binding to the outside of the needle folder
- Centrally sew the ribbon tie to the needle folder on the outside. Fold the ends of the needle folder in to the centre and fold again, this means the packets of needles will not fall out. Tie the folder closed with the ribbon



## HAND NEEDLE FOLDER

## by Heather Ford

## $1 / 4$ " seam allowance throughout

## REQUIREMENTS

50 cm main fabric
25 cm lining fabric
25 cm 630 or 640 iron on pellon
90 cm ribbon for tie
Thread for quilting and constructing the folder


## CONSTRUCTION

- Cut a $20^{\prime \prime} \times 8^{\prime \prime}$ piece of main fabric, lining fabric and pellon
- Fuse the pellon to the wrong side of the main fabric and pin the lining fabric wrong side to the back of the pellon
- Quilt as desired, (I grid quilted on the diagonal.) Then cut back to measure 20 " $71 / 4$ and zigzag the raw edge
- From the main fabric and lining fabric cut 4 pockets $31 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 71 / 4^{\prime \prime}$. Lay the main and lining fabric pocket pieces right sides together and on three pockets stitch along both long sides to form a cylinder, turn right sides out and press, top stitch along one long edge; this will be the top edge of the pockets. On the fourth pocket stitch along only one long side, turn right side out and press, top stitch this stitched edge, this will be the top edge of the pocket.
- Draw a line across the quilted main folder piece at the $5^{\prime \prime}, 10^{\prime \prime}$ and $15^{\prime \prime}$ points of the length. This is the placement line for the base of the pockets. Pin the pocket with the open long edge level with one end of the quilted piece and the other 3 pockets along the drawn lines. Stitch the pockets in place along the base and stay stitch in place at the sides.
- On the pockets measure in $2^{1 / 2 "}$ from both sides of the main folder piece, stitch a line parallel to the edge of the folder to form three small pockets from each pocket piece.
- From the main fabric construct a $11 / 4$ " $655^{\prime \prime}$ single fold binding. Stitch the binding to the pocket side of the needle folder, $(1 / 4$ " seam allowance,) fold the binding to the outside of the needle folder, fold the raw edge under and invisibly hand stitch the folded edge of the binding to the outside of the needle folder
- Centrally sew the ribbon tie to the needle folder on the outside. Fold the ends of the needle folder in to the centre and fold again, this means the packets of needles will not fall out. Tie the folder closed with the ribbon.



## USED HAND NEEDLES STORAGE FLAP

## REQUIREMENTS

$1 \times 10^{\prime \prime}$ square main fabric
$1 \times 10^{\prime \prime}$ square pellon
$1 \times 10^{\prime \prime}$ square of calico or light tone on tone fabric
$2 \times 1 \frac{1 / 4}{}$ " WOF strips of fabric for binding or $1.50 \mathrm{~m} \times 2.5 \mathrm{~cm}\left(1^{\prime \prime}\right)$ wide bias binding
50 cm ribbon for a tie


## CONSTRUCTION

* Sandwich the main fabric, pellon and calico $10^{\prime \prime}$ squares as for a quilt
* Mark horizontal lines down the $10^{\prime \prime}$ square $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ apart. Measure in $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ from the left hand edge of the square and mark vertical lines across the rest of the $10^{\prime \prime}$ square $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ apart. Quilt on all the lines. The quilted grid forms rows of $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ boxes and a row of $21 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ rectangles along the left hand side of the $10^{\prime \prime}$ square.
* Zig zag the raw edges of the square
* Join the $2 \times 11 / 4$ " WOF strips at the narrow end to form a binding strip and bind the square using the single fold binding method or bind with the bias binding
* Using a permanent marker and beginning with the third rectangle from the top record the names of the hand needle types you have in your collection.
* Then write the numbers 1 to 13 in the top row of boxes (These are the needle sizes)
* Cut the ribbon in half and stitch each piece in place at the centre, along the top and bottom edges of the square so you can tie the ribbon to close the flap

## CONSTRUCTION PART SIX



We've arrived at the final week of our mystery - we're going to complete 9 of our second block and put our quilt top together.

Use the photograph on the right as a guide to creating 36 UNIT Cs. These units have the same construction as last week but use a different fabric combination.

1. Take your 9 @ Fabric Two $43 / 16$ " squares (Labelled 'C2') and cut in half diagonally twice to create 36 quarter square 'C2' triangles.
2. To each of the remaining 36 Background Fabric 2 5/8" squares (Labelled E) add a Fabric Two 'C2' triangle as shown. Press seam towards the dark fabric.
3. Gather your remaining 36 Fabric One 'B' triangles and add to the other side of your 36 Background Fabric squares as shown.
4. Take your remaining Fabric Two 2 3/8" 'B2' triangles and add to the third side of your background square, as shown. It should sit next to the larger Fabric Two 'C2' triangle.

5. Press and clip all the dog ears.
6. Take your 36 UNIT Bs from Part 5 and your 36 UNIT Cs from this week and join - as shown opposite (top of the photo).
7. You now have all the components from Parts One, Three and Six to make your 9 blocks.
8. Lay out your 9 Star Blocks on point and add the 4 blocks from Step Four in the empty centre spaces.
9. Cut your 2 @ 19" Background Fabric squares in half, diagonally, twice to create 8 (oversized to allow trimming) setting triangles.
10. Cut your 2 @ 9.5" Background Fabric squares in half diagonally to create 4 corner triangles.
11. Add 2 large setting triangles (from Step 9) to each side, and


STAR BLOCK - MAKE 9 your 4 smaller triangles (from Step 10) at each corner.
12. Stitch your quilt top components together in diagonal rows as shown below.
Remember - the side setting triangles have been cut oversize, so will need to be trimmed after pressing.

Your quilt should measure 51" square.

At this stage you might like to consider adding borders. I chose to use components from our quilt blocks in designing mine - reversing the fabrics in the corner stars to create long arrows


For Heather's quilt, we added a narrow border of Fabric One and then a wider border of her black background fabric.
