"DONE TO DENIM" POSTCARD CHALLENGE To feature in a special exhibition at the 2022 Festival of Quilts

The challenge is to make a postcard quilt made from denim.

- * Minimum size is 6" x 4" and no larger than 4" x 8½".
- * Any technique or medium
- Can be bound, bagged, raw edge zig zagged, blanket stitch or your choice
- Can be stiffened to post or soft to put in an envelope. One side must have an area to write a name and address and attach postage stamps. It could be card (manila folder works well or scrapbooking paper) or fabric. Please write your name on the back so they can be returned to you.

Will consist of three layers

- * A decorative front
- * A middle layer of stiffening or wadding of some sort or vilene
- * A backing of card or fabric





I quickly threw together the samples in a couple of hours, so they are not at all special. I am sure you can come up with a masterpiece.

History of the fabric postcard

Postcards started to appear around the beginning of the 20th Century and were predominantly from printed silk designs which were then hand embroidered. They rose in popularity during WW1 and WW2 and were sent to soldiers with words of encouragement. Even the soldiers made them and sent them to loved ones; these have become very collectable and valuable works of art and are of historical value.

Today's Postcard Fabric Art is so diverse that they have become quite an art form in themselves. They are very popular as themed swaps and challenges including on social media all over the world.

SA Quilters is proud to support our ongoing initiative with the children's ward at Flinders Medical Centre. We recently delivered our second consignment for the year – over 60 quilts that we've been told are always very much appreciated by both children and caregivers who spend varying lengths of time in this ward.

Our preference is to supply bright, cheerful, child appropriate quilts that are 40" x 60" in size, although there is some flexibility in these measurements as there are varying ages of children in the ward. There are also times when accompanying adults are offered a larger quilt if they stay with children overnight.

We like our quilts to be labelled with SA Quilters 'Quilts of Love' labels, so please collect from the Flinders Kids desk at SA Quilters meetings or contact me to have some mailed out to you or to your group. Slipping the label beneath the binding is quick and easy, but more challenging for me once the quilt is bound!

We recently received several bags of Flinders Kids quilts from the Cleve Country Quilters that were very welcome. The group clearly have a defined process happening – a shared pool of wonderfully cheerful fabrics, some tried and true go-to patterns and possibly a day or two of dedicated stitching. The quilts were all the same size and catered for both genders plus gender neutral quilts. I'd like to shout out a huge thank you to the Cleve Country Quilters – your process is one that other groups might like to try too.

I'm often asked about what makes a good quilt design for boys. Having seen lots of great ideas I have to confess that the best ones make good use of a pre-printed panel – trucks, spaceships, motor bikes, cars, trains, bugs and other critters. They are also quick to make by just adding some pieced or plain borders to bring them up to size.

At this moment my Flinders Kids cupboard is totally bare, and I'd love to be able to put together another 60 quilts ready for the next delivery request. To that end I'm going to reinvigorate the QGSA Flinders Kids Facebook page with a monthly design idea and commit to making at least one quilt of this design each month myself.

Please drop by the **Flinders Kids** Facebook page to check out this month's *Falling Charms* design links and feel free to post photos of your quilt to inspire others to join in the challenge.

I've mentioned the Cleve Country Quilters, but I am only too aware that there are other groups and individuals who regularly support the Flinders Kids program. Thank you all – your contributions are very much valued and appreciated.

- participation in an overseas educational tour.


Country Grants are available to country groups and should be for activities designed to help a whole group, or the community at large, e.g.:

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"Dare to Differ – 2022" - Contemporary Quilts

This exhibition features a juried selection of contemporary art guilts from textile artists all around Australia. The aim is to present the transformation in contemporary quilting by extending the limits of art textiles, quilt making and the courage to "dare to differ".

"Dare to Differ" exhibitions are held biennially, and originated after a small group came together in South Australia more than 25 years ago with the aim of promoting and showcasing contemporary art quilts in this state.

The interpretation of the theme is left to the quilt maker. Contemporary quilt makers are encouraged to extend their horizons, leaning more towards contemporary Visual Arts. The exhibition is open to all quilt makers within Australia. By opening entries to interstate contemporary quilt makers, South Australian quilt makers and the general public get the opportunity to view a very high standard exhibition of contemporary art quilts.

A definition of a quilt for this exhibition is that it must be predominantly fibre, and be composed of a least two distinct layers, stitched together throughout the quilt. It must be innovative, original and of course meet the criteria of the title "Dare to Differ". Entries were preselected from photos - one of the whole quilt and one detail. The selection process is done by two contemporary quilt artists with an international standing. This year the selectors were Suzanne Gummow and Zara Zannettino.

The exhibitions in the past have been exciting, diverse and of an extremely high standard and this 2022 exhibition is no exception.

SA QUILTERS BMT





construction. Rachael uses a variety of fabrics and embellishments in her quilts, and there were

HEATHER'S TIP - LEADERS AND ENDERS

Fold a piece of scrap fabric in half and use it as a leader or ender. Use it to start or end a row of sewing, and it is very handy as you can chain piece using this scrap of fabric as either a leader and ender. A couple of advantages are that you save thread because you don't have tails of thread to cut, and the double layer of fabric matches the pieces you are sewing together which helps with the tension. You could also sew together blocks for another quilt top as your leader or ender if they are already cut out. Two for the price of one!
