Interstate Judge Deborah Laurie Our interstate Judge this year is Deborah Laurie. Deborah started patchwork classes in 2003 and in 2005 joined two groups as well as the NSW Guild.

The styles of quilts Deborah enjoys making are quite varied from American Civil War Reproductions to Modern quilts. Pieced quilts with strong colours and geometric designs are her favourite. In 2012, Deborah won the Best Use of Colour at the Sydney Quilt Show and has won a number of minor prizes for pieced quilts.

Deborah has volunteered for QuiltNSW in various roles and has served on the Exhibition Sub-Committee since 2010. In 2012, Deborah attended a 2 day Judging Workshop with a certified American Judge, hosted by Vic Quilters. In 2015 Deborah assisted with the set up the Judges Education Program for QuiltNSW and has been involved since that time.

Deborah has had the privilege of judging a number of local and state quilt shows including the Queensland Quilters Quilt Show in 2019, Australian Modern Quilt Show in 2015 and the Best of Australia quilt in 2017 and 2019.














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
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
SA Quilters Modern Mix Group is very happy to be sharing more of their creations with you again this year at the Festival of Quilts.

Riverlea Special Exhibition of Japanese Manhole Covers quilts and the story behind them.



Lyn Uphill has been the quilt shop owner of Riverlea Quilts for the last 35 years. Lyn has also had a lifelong love of all things Japanese and started visiting Japan and bringing back fabric and new ideas for classes and workshops for the last 19 years.

A result of this interest, is that Riverlea Quilts has a very strong focus on Japanese Quilts with a large range of Japanese fabric sourced from Japan.

Lyn's classes demonstrate Japanese techniques and encourage creativity rather than reproduction of what other people have made. There are currently about 40 people who attend.

The exhibition at Festival of Quilts shares the story of manhole covers that are found on the roads all over Japan. Lyn noticed them in one of her first trips to Japan and thought they would be a wonderful idea for a quilt.

Lyn teaches a group of excited quilters who are keen to share at the Festival of Quilts just how creative Japanese Quilting can be.

I'd like to acknowledge the recent passing of a much loved Life Member of SA Quilters, Roma Good. Roma joined the Quilters Guild in 1985 and was made a life member in 2004.

She was a member of the Quilt Encounter (QE) committee for 20 years and continued as a member of the Clayton's Committee when they relinquished the job of running QE ten years ago. She will be missed by many.

The following are some words about Roma written by Lessa Siegele:

"Roma was a very dearly loved long time member of the Quilters Guild, joining in 1985. She was made a Life Member in 2004 for her work for the Guild. In particular she was a member of the QE committee that for 20 years ran the very successful live-in 5 day Quilt Camp. During this time this group of ten started fundraising activities and when they handed over the running of the camp, they continued to work together and renamed themselves the Clayton's Committee.

After now thirty years the group members have developed a very strong bond, and have continued to meet and pursue their fundraising. Roma thoroughly enjoyed coming to the quilt making workshops and would stand all day ironing and chatting to the quilters who attended. She made a significant contribution to the preparation for these days by counting thousands of fabric pieces for packaging in the quilt kits, and has continued to do this when she moved into care recently aged 94. There were frequent phone calls asking for more "homework". Workshops and sales of quilt kits have achieved donations of \$350,000 to Bedford and \$5,400 to the Guild's recent Biggest Morning Tea.

The group also makes quilts that are donated to various hospitals, and Roma has made many quilts for this program. As well as all the volunteer work Roma made lovely quilts in her 'signature' pretty floral fabrics. Her committee friends always looked forward to enjoying her butterfly cakes and chocolates for morning tea. She has been a wonderful inspiration to many. The Claytons committee girls in particular will really miss her."

Little Quilts for Kids



My Years of Sewing

I was born in the 1950's, so am a Baby Boomer, and as such most Baby Boomers started leaning to sew when they were quite young. I started learning to sew at a very young age at my grandmothers Singer hand sewing machine that her father bought for her at the age of 12 which was in 1903. This machine was passed on to my mother which she used rather than unpack her treadle sewing machine. Then when my mother passed away in 2021 it was then passed on to me. The machine is now 120 years old.

When I started working at the age of 17, I bought a cheap Singer machine which did me for a while, then in 1979 I brought a <u>Pfaff 1222 E</u> sewing machine which was top of the range at the time and was rated the top sewing machine in Choice Magazine. On this machine I made lots of clothes including my wedding dress and the bridesmaid dress which my sister wore.



In the early 80's I attended Marleston TAFE part time over 4 years and did "Industrial Pattern Making for Women's Wear.". As I worked in the sewing industry, I made a lot of my half-scale patterns on this machine, for the course. I worked as a Training Officer at Bedford Industries teaching clients to sew on various industrial sewing machines.

I was married in 1985 and then shortly after we had our two sons Michael and Benjamin. Then I started sewing children's clothing from nightwear to stretch knit wear using an overlocker and many other clothes through the years as they were growing up.

In 2007 I started adult classes at Hamilton Secondary College to do Quilting. After the many things I had sewn in the past I had not done quilting. This was a new experience for me as the seams were ¼ inch and the cutting was different using a Rotary Cutter etc. but as it turned out I did quite well and won a prize at the end of the year for being top of the class. These classes I attended till 2016. During this time, I had made many projects not just quilts and eventually bought an Embroidery Machine after seeing the many beautiful projects in *"The Textile and Machine Embroidery Magazine"*. I ventured into that area and mixed the quilting with machine embroidery. When my first grandchild Henry was coming, I made a machine embroidered quilt with appliquéd animals on. This quilt I entered in the Royal Adelaide Show in the machine embroidery section, and I won 2nd prize. For my next Grandchild Charlotte I also made an embroidered quilt which had stitchery designs and I incorporated the Fruit of the Spirit words, Love, Patience, Kindness etc on it. Now I am still sewing another granddaughter's quilt as Sophie was born last October and we had just moved house, so it took me awhile to

find it in the packing. There are other quilts I have yet to find in the packing as there are a few quilt tops that are finished, and they are up to the quilting stage.

Over the years I have had a few sewing machines. My first sewing machine that was given to me in 1962 when I was six was a little Singer all metal sewing machine. This I still have in the box with the instruction booklet and I also have the docket for it which was bought in pounds and shillings. I have a Pfaff 1222 E which I still have, I then bought a Pfaff Grand Quilter which I bought the first year I was quilting. This is a great machine for piecing, I still have this machine also. I then ventured into the Janome machines but since have gone onto Bernina. I have a Bernina 700QE with embroidery module and a Bernina 435 which I take to Sit & Sew etc. I also have a Janome 500E machine which is an embroidery only machine, which I have used a lot. I also have a Janome air thread overlocker and a Janome Cover stitch machine which is used for finishing hems on stretch knit fabrics.

I have been fortunate over the years to have my grandmother and my mother guiding me with my sewing and



being told "If you do a job, you do it properly". Also, when I worked in the sewing industry, I made things for the Australian forces, and these had to be done very well so I got into a habit of checking my work all the time.

I hope in the years to come that I can introduce my grandchildren to sewing - especially quilting - and that they will take it on and love it as I have done over the years. They will find it rewarding and enjoying it and looking at the finished product and be pleased for what they have achieved.



SA Quilters—Community Quilts

The Windmill Stitchers were formed as an interest group with the Kaniva & District Learning Group in about 1999. What started out as a monthly session has become 3 times a month Sit n'Sew with an average of 6 ladies spending a day stitching or sewing either their own projects or making quilts for charity. The group has 13 financial members to date. The group is now auspiced by the Kaniva Neighbourhood House with a small committee to organize and manage the group's activities. We are thankful that we have access to a wonderful space each session and occasionally when we have a special project and we need extra space we are fortunate that there are a few of different venues we can use.

Kaniva is situated "just over the border" in Victoria and is known for Sheep Art and a beautifully painted silo and our name comes from the huge windmill you see as you drive into town. If you travel from Adelaide to Melbourne you will go through Kaniva. A great stopping place to rest, and check out the eateries and our art!

The Windmill Stitchers began their charity quilt making about 6 years ago when we became aware of the Very Snuggly Quilt (VSQ) program run by Vicquilters.. To be able to buy wadding and backing fabric, our biggest expense, every two years the Windmill Stitchers have a public challenge where those interested can purchase a 10" square of fabric and using whatever method they prefer (with some rules) they must make a 12.5" unfinished square which is suitable for a child. In 2022 we made three quilts using the blocks received, which have been gifted to Flinders Kids.

We have continued to make quilts for children and whilst it can be difficult to get them to Melbourne, we have been lucky to have people volunteer to make a drop off when they have traveled to the big smoke. Covid lock-downs impacted our time together but our members continued to sew at home with a couple of ladies providing challenges for us via email. Since February 2020 we have donated 155 quilts to VSQ. Unfortunately, since this donation and as the Royal Children's Hospital was closed to the public during lockdown, quilts were not being delivered, therefor a backlog has occurred and VSQ are not accepting quilts at the moment. What to do with our quilts which were piling up in our homes! SA Quilters and Flinders Kids came onto our radar. After reading Facebook posts from SA Quilters it was suggested that we make contact to see if our quilts were acceptable. Fortunately for all, 10 big bags with 86 quilts were delivered on Tuesday 30th May!

Already our ladies are busy at their machines creating more wonderful quilts for our next delivery!

Quilters Strip Poker

No! I-Patch isn't going risque! A few months ago, the Gawler Quilting Group posted photos of members playing "Strip Poker". Since then a lot of people have commented that they would like the instructions Sonia Holton from the Gawler Quilting Group has provided the instructions below

Equipment

Sonia advised that you'll need to make the equipment. Print out the letters "C", "L", "R", "X" and a Star and stick them on blank dice (see photo below).

The Game

Strips of fabrics are used instead of poker chips. Players sit around a table and all players put 1 strip of fabric in the centre of the table. Players take turns clockwise rolling the die once for each turn. The letter that is rolled determines the action the player must take.

- C = the player puts 1 fabric strip in the centre of the table
- L = the player gives 1 fabric strip to the player on their left
- R = the player gives 1 fabric strip to the player on their right
- X = the player loses one turn

Star = the player takes all the strips in the centre of the table. All players then put 1 strip in the centre of the table to start again.

Play continues until the time is up and a bell is rung to notify the end of the game. The length of time that each round goes for is determined by the playing group before the start of the game.

The origin of the game is Quilters Unlimited in Virginia.

Miscellaneous

There was a delicious spread of sweet and savoury treats available during the SA Quilters Biggest Morning Tea held in May. The offerings had been made or donated by the generous SA Quilters members. There were a lot of compliments made during the day, on how delicious the food was and therefore we have included the recipe for Florentine Slice made by Jill Christian.

Florentine Slice recipe from Jill Christian

Base Ingredients: 125 g butter (chopped) 200g dark chocolate (chopped) 1/2 cup caster sugar 2 eggs (beaten) 1 1/2 cups flour

Topping Ingredients: 80g butter 2/3 cup caster sugar 2 Tbsp golden syrup 2 Tbsp cream 100g flaked almonds 1/2 cup red glazed cherries (chopped) 2 cups cornflakes (lightly crushed) 100g dark chocolate melts (optional - for decoration)



Method :

Preheat oven to 180 C. Grease and line a 20 cm x 30 cm Lamington pan.

The Base :

Combine butter and chocolate in a medium pan and stir over low heat until chocolate is melted and the mixture is smooth. Remove from the heat and stir in sugar, eggs and flour. Spread mix evenly into prepared pan. Freeze while preparing topping

The Topping :

Combine butter, sugar, syrup and cream in a medium saucepan. Stir over low heat until sugar dissolved and the mix is smooth. Cook stirring for about 5 minutes, or until mix is thickened and becomes a light caramel colour. Remove from the heat. Work quickly, storing in nuts, cherries and cornflakes. Mix well. With a spatular, spread the hot topping over the chilled base. Cook in the oven for about 25 minutes, or until lightly browned. Cool the slice in the pan. Melt the chocolate melts and drizzle over the slice.

Allow to set before cutting into squares.
