JEMIMA FLENDT'S AMAZING TRUNK SHOW

Jemima Flendt of 'Tied With A Ribbon' was one of the first quilters I followed on Instagram. I was attracted to her use



was when I heard that she was coming to give a Trunk Show on the last night of Quilt Encounter. I was unable to attend Quilt Encounter this year, but nothing was going to get in my way of attending Jemima's Trunk Show at the Stamford Grand in Glenelg.

This was the first Trunk Show I have attended, and I didn't really know what to expect, but settled in to one of the few spare seats, at this very well attended event, excited about the upcoming talk. Jemima talked us through her quilting journey, interspersing stories of her family between displaying beautiful quilts.



Like many other quilters, Jemima has been influenced by her grandmothers. Jemima had a love of sewing and crochet from an early age and developed this passion further by becoming a Home Economics teacher, later creating her Tied With A Ribbon business.

Jemima has a love of equilateral triangles and has created beautiful quilts, such as the extremely popular Love Triangle quilt and End Game quilt, solely out of equilateral triangles. Jemima also has a love of applique and showed us a sample from her Sewing Quotes Mini Quilt range, 'Measure Once, Cuss Twice' and 'Just Sew Happy.' Jemima explained how her patterns for this range had alternative wording options, and the mini quilt size allowed creators to finish a great looking project quickly.



Jemima opened up to the group by describing her experience of publishing her first book. She spent many hours creating the book and collaborated closely with an American publisher, only to have unfortunate events play out at the time of publishing that left her exhausted, devastated, and vowing not to publish another book. Thankfully Jemima is resilient and has now published three books:

Weekend Quilting, Quilt Big, and the most recent, Quilt It, Crochet It. The recent book brings together Jemima's love of quilting and crochet. It offers the same pattern with a quilt option and a crochet option. If you are interested in these books, they are available in the SA Quilters library.

Personally, I have been in a recent quilting slump, with work, and my little guide dog puppy, sapping the life out of me, and unfortunately my sewing machine has been put away for a couple months. Sitting in the audience listening to Jemima's enthusiasm for our craft left me inspired to dust off the machine and move it back to its normal place on the living room table. I have taken inspiration from Jemima's use of colour and her process of finding a fun, large print fabric for the backing, and then pulling colours for the front from the colours used in the backing fabric. I was also drawn to how Jemima used bright coloured cottons to quilt some of her projects. The quilting was simple, but the coloured thread gave



the quilt a special feature.

I am anxiously awaiting the release of Jemima's new quilt pattern, Denim Pockets Quilt, which we got a sneak preview of, and which looks amazing. Jemima has combined bright colours with a fun pattern, and it has got my quilting juices flowing. The pattern drops on October 13 and a quilt along starts near the end of October. Do Quilts need labels for competition?

I was recently asked the question as to whether quilts need a label and is there a hard and fast rule about whether a quilt without a label would be judged in quilt competition?

For competition, personally I would judge whatever is put before me, whether it has a label or no label, as long as it fits the criteria of the competition and or category, as set out by the competition organisers. Whether it has a label or not is of no significance to me as a judge.

However, competition organisers can state quilts without labels will not be judged. This is really to avoid any discrepancy as to the quilt's identity and or the identity of the quilt maker, and to be able to return the quilt to its rightful maker. It would be unfortunate for a prize-winning quilt to be credited to the wrong person.

Personally, I encourage any Quilter to develop a habit of putting labels on their quilts as part to their finishing process. Ideally it should be attached so that it is sewn into the binding, for permanence and security. (But any label is better than none at all).

At the very least, labels should contain the name of the Quilt (for identification purposes), the makers name and the year of completion. This means when we are long gone, or if our quilts change hands, this information is still with the quilt and not forgotten.

If others were involved in making the quilt, their names should be included. Eg. a Long Arm Quilter or if it was a group quilt, the group name and possibly members names who contributed. The year work on the quilt commenced may be added.

If the quilt is an original design this should be added. Otherwise, it is respectful to acknowledge the pattern source or designer, and if it was commenced during a workshop.

Further information such as for whom the quilt was made, why the quilt was made and a special message may be added.

Labels should include information about the materials and washing or care instructions.

Eg. 100% cotton fabrics with 100% cotton wadding

Gentle Machine wash

Dry flat in the shade

I often add : Use a Colour Catcher with the wash.

For competition, it should be the maker's responsibility to ensure the quilt has a label, and that the maker's name is covered, wherever it may appear on the quilt. A piece of fabric loosely stitched or tacked or pinned may be enough, or masking tape under this may be necessary to conceal the name. It is then up to the exhibition committee to check this is adequate at the time the quilt is handed in. The quilt receivers may ask the person handing in the quilt to do more. It is helpful to have materials available at this time, for them to use to cover the name and a space set aside for this.

So, to answer the question about is there a hard and fast rule about labels on quilts, there is none set by judges, but this can be stipulated by exhibition organisers for logistical reasons. And an informative label will add to a quilt's value.

Featured Quilter Judy Wiggins About Me

I have been sewing since I was 8 years old. My first machine was a toy sewing machine which I made my dolls clothes on.

During my senior years at school my favourite subject was Home Economics because of the dressmaking tuition. I could use "Big sewing machines" and so I was completely hooked!

When I was 13, Santa gave me a singer treadle machine, and so I then spent lots of time in my room making clothes and things.

Somewhere along the line I got my hands on a patchwork magazine and began to make a little hexagon quilt for my dolls crib. I still enjoyed my dolls as they inspired me to make little samples of designs for bigger clothing.

I am one of 8 children. I have 6 brothers and 1 sister all born and raised in the western suburbs of Adelaide. I grew up a bit of a 'Tomboy' as it was called then.

I was very accomplished in athletics and sewing at school and not much else;) My dreams as a child were to go to the Olympics and become a dressmaker. I did not achieve either of them, but I could run like the wind and no-one could catch me. An excellent skill to possess when you have 6 brothers to escape!

We had a large tree in our backyard where I made myself a retreat/fortress for me and my dolls to escape. Up in my tree I could see my mischievous brothers attempting to climb and sabotage my dolls. I was always ready for them though! The tree was an olive tree so naturally I always had plenty of ammunition to pelt them with and a water pistol at hand to give them a little wash. Little did I know back then, these bush survival skills were going to come in handy when I joined the Army as a Medic much later in life.

When I left home, I travelled within Australia for a few years before settling in WA and marrying. I have three children and 5 grandchildren. I continued to sew clothes and home furnishings whilst my children were young. I stopped sewing for a while as life was very busy.

In the early 80's I went to a market and fell in love with a quilt that was on show. I bought that quilt, and it inspired me to start sewing again, and I still have it.

Since then, I have been madly collecting fabric, books, patterns etc and making quilts for family, friends, and charity.

I have belonged to a few community quilt groups over the years, and I am currently a member of Chicago Quilters of Kilburn.

At one stage of my life, I had a dream of owning a quilting fabric store. My version of that dream became an online store where I sold handmade babies' clothes, home furnishings, fabric, and quilts. This style of business suited my lifestyle at the time, but I still imagined owning that fabric store.

Fast forward a few more years and life dealt me some health traumas that were to change my ideas and life plans. After a long rehabilitation period my darling husband Roy encouraged and supported me to learn how to Longarm Quilt. And so, in 2018 Oasis Quilting Services was born.

Roy and I both love the quilting business and really enjoy meeting people. It is so inspiring and a real privilege to see all the beautiful quilts that come in to our studio. To compliment a quiltmakers top by adding a unique beautiful pattern on it is an awesome process.

We also love to inspire others by sharing our quilting knowledge and skills and helping with advice regarding quilt construction.

Birmingham 2023 by Candy Walker

With a Mediterranean cruise planned and Australia playing England for the Ashes, the dates aligned to offer a holiday bonus...the Birmingham Quilt show.

We arrived at the National Exhibition Centre (NEC) via Birmingham Airport International railway station. We did a fair bit of train travel and used 'Trainline app' and a 'travel together' discount card.

Logistics: The NEC site is vast but easy to walk. On arrival at the station, you access the NEC halls, various hotels, an adventure park, a lake, a resort style mall with some outlet shops, casino, cinema and lots of restaurants. For airport you use a twominute monorail shuttle which plays delightful music to take away any stress you might be feeling...



We chose Novotel Birmingham Airport. With the shuttle across the road, had it been raining, we would have stayed dry.

The hotel is soundproof, it didn't feel like an airport. There was a tiny minibar fridge which was just enough to hold fruit & snacks to make porridge in a mug for breakfast with a croissant. We bought supplies each evening at the airport convenience store. This meant I didn't need to be up early or spend big on a rushed hotel breakfast.

Some hotels on the site are walking distance, others further away use shuttle buses.

Inside the NEC there are tunnels to walk and a travelator.

Heather stayed at the Moxy, Gina stayed at the Arden – ask them if you are planning a trip.

The carpark around the centre is huge. Some hotels and the carparks have shuttles but not very early, a hassle for volunteers. Staying offsite is an option but with high cost of daily train, travel time and/or carpark, onsite hotels good unless you really need to self-cater.

On the way in we could get a sandwich/drink/snack meal deal.

At the show itself I had a fabulous cheese & onion pie (very British) and the best scones with jam and clotted cream.

With ticketing, there were single tickets, two-day packages and deluxe package with tickets, catalogue, storage for your things, special area access for lunch, car park.

All the information is available if you sign up for emails and follow, the website.

There was a full programme of pre-show one and two-day classes. I chose 'Pojagi' with Maryse Allard from France as a quiet hand stitching day. Tucked away upstairs away from the show halls. I took a packed lunch & my flask. 10am-5pm it was a full day with a short break for lunch.

All activities (except product displays/demos by the retail exhibitors) were ticketed.

Daily program of Academy Talks and lectures as well as short workshops.

Evening presentation by special guest Angela Walters and a separate evening 20th birthday party.

The four-day event opened on Thursday with about 700 (?) quilts on display.

Quilt entries in 18 categories, 7 Artists with their Textile Galleries, International Quilt Museum and European Quilt Association (Flower Power challenge) displays, Quilters' Guild Museum Collection, SAQA, Fine Art Textiles award supported by the Surface Design Association (amazing).

Being the 20th birthday for the show, there was a very good retrospective section.

Quilts hang in categories. In the afternoon of the first day, winning quilts are then moved to a separate display. This means they are not with their peers, but you can easily navigate all the winning quilts in one place. A catalogue and show guide are vital to read about everything and plan.

Most interesting was a new 'sustainable' category, defined (in part) as a quilt that has been made with minimal negative impact on the environment.



Also 'Quilt Creations' defined (in part) as clothing, wearable art or three-dimensional pieces.

Unlike our special awards, quilts can be entered, aside from the normal category, for an 'overlay' award which means they are judged for the quilting on the piece. Hand, Machine, Longarm Quilting and Thread mastery. My favourite quilt won the hand quilting overlay award (TD18).

Special Features at the show included Creative Textiles studio, a daily program of artists demonstrating printing, collage, book-binding and similar techniques.

Graduate Showcase, city & Guilds Bursaries - small booths for each graduate showing their work. Young quilters drop in, Terrence Higgins Memorial Quilt,

Liberty display and Grace company come and try.

Retail area with all the usual sorts of quilt offerings. Three Australian businesses (that I saw). Dressmaking is popular, with fabric on the roll for sale and patterns with clothes, mostly easy fit linen & blends, made up to view.

The event is presented by Immediate Live and volunteers run the quilt show.

I volunteered for a two-hour session (white gloves) and was assigned the winners avenue.

I really enjoyed talking to people about the quilts and two hours was just right. If you sign up for two or more sessions, then you get free show entry. I had already bought my ticket package, but it was great to be part of the Facebook group, see a little of the show organisation and meet fellow quilters. We had access to the volunteers' room...with the cake! I was able to collect my catalogue and guide on day one even though my session was on day three.

The week before the show we had a zoom meeting to say hello, with a talk by one of the judges (I think they have about 20) about the judging process and judging in general.

In summary I took a day to wander around, with planned breaks at a morning (Ekta Kaul) and afternoon (Sarah Payne) talks. Two days to look at the quilts and galleries including volunteering and the evening talk. Final day doing four fun mini 1 hour or 90 minutes workshops – Atarashii, Machine Sew a Selfie, Wrapped Pebbles and Gelli plate printing.

As always at a quilt event there is plenty to see, do and learn and be inspired by. Birmingham did not disappoint.

Gray thread around floral patterns is dusty from time. Colour transitions like warm light from the childhood of the happies child in the world.

Traditional – First place, 54 entries

In the winners' area, this quilt had amazing, quilted detail, especially viewed from the back.



Although tonal the colour radiated and was quite beautiful in conjunction with the maker's story.

ST 44 – Sustainable by Russell Barratt

'Oh my Giddy Aunt' About giddy joy! The sustainable category was so very interesting – with 90 entries! The category requirements are very specific. Each time I looked at this one it did bring joy and a smile at the cleverness – maybe it was the yellow...

MD 09 – Balance by Vendulka Battais

Own design inspired by an abstract painting. Technique from online class with Sheila Frampton-Cooper Modern – first place, I had a special interest in this category. Photos to share with our SA Quilters modern group. 64 entries

British groups – a clever map presentation of where you will find local quilting communities in the British Isles.

There is always a debate on whether or not to pre-wash you quilting fabric. I always pre-wash and believe it results in a better finished quilt. Here is a short piece with some valuable tips on pre-washing which may just make things easier for you to start the habit -

On the **trading table** we have lots of evenweave linen from 16 to 45 count – small and large quantities. Tea towel type linen suitable for surface stitches, fine cutwork linen, lugana, just to name a few. Bits and pieces as in zips, buckles, buttons, beads, knitting needles and crochet hooks. Frames and hoops – if you are after a roller type frame we have plenty of these.

Threads – from hand dyed to crewel wools, perle cottons, stranded cottons, silks and tapestry wools. There are also patterns and kits in surface stitchery and cross stitch.

For those who like surface stitches we have a lot of printed linens from cloths to pillow cases, table runners and small mats.

The gift corner has children's clothing from size 1 to 12 all made by Marione Mansfield. Pincushions, needlecases and scissor fobs made by Carol Young. Bags, containers for your thread ends, potholders and iPad bags made by Robyn Inverarity.

No doubt the Museum will let you know what they will have to tempt you.
