Featured Quilter—Sue Knuckey "Sew it all Began"




My first memory of being introduced to quilting was when I was in year 5 at a small country town called Melrose. A lady from the CWA came to school to teach us English paper piecing hexagons.

High school was next sewing the mandatory pencil case and boxer shorts.

My Mum and grandma are both excellent sewers. My mum recognised early that I would best learn from my grandma who taught me to make my own clothes and when our children

arrived introduced me to smoking in garments.




When the kids came along my sewing tools came out again. Our first son was born and my grandma made him a smocked outfit. This started my love of smocking and embroidery and relight the need to sew clothing again. I found out I was having a daughter so before she arrived I took lessons and began making little smocked dresses.



While the children were small I started working for Country Bumpkin cutting and pleating kits at home, then teaching smoking and embroidery, and working at the shop on Kensington Road. I was drawn to teaching sit and sew classes and enjoyed helping students with the variety of projects and skill level that came to class. Country Bumpkin was the place that introduced me to William Morris colours and designs and to this day I try to include a piece of William Morris in my quilts.

Before long the children were off to school so another mum and I decided to take quilt lessons. We made a sampler once again used cheap fabrics just in case we

did not like it, learnt lots and I was definitely hooked. Stitch in Time opened in Highgate. I began working in the shop, kit making and teaching. The



I have loved meeting people, helping with fabric decisions and guiding customers making their special guilts. A place where I have met lifelong friends.





patterned fabric

I love trying all different techniques and styles of quilting and have everything from traditional, needle turn appliqué, collage to improv projects on the go.

Early on I decided I wanted to master needle turn applique and saw a quilt in a magazine. I loved it and set about making 500, 3 and half inch squares with an applique circle in the middle of it. The best tip I had heard was three small stiches at t time. I recreated the Aunt Greens quilt, I drew all my shapes from a picture in a book and guessed the proportions, I was hooked on applique and something I go back to time and time again.

I often have said that a sit and sew class beats a counselling session any day and for me it has been the fuel for me to keep quilting and trying new things, students and friends I quilt with continue to motivate me to learn and try new quilt techniques.

My taste in fabrics are getting brighter with time with so many quilt artist inspiring me, Margaret Sampson George, Susan Smith, Jen Kingwell, Kathy Doughty, Tula Pink, Lori Holt and Laure Heine just to name a few.



Life is changing again with less work and more time to quilt. I am looking forward to being involved with Dare 2 Differ exhibition and participating in the Modern

monthly meetings. I enjoy sharing my knowledge about quilting and having some fun along the way.

I have now been quilting for over 30 years, some would say traditional or contemporary but I am not sure what style I am as I love to try everything.

- Quilt delivery to any designated SAQ member shop as listed on the SAQ web site

FLINDERS KIDS

COMFORT QUILTS

- Managed by Kate Seinor
- Supplies guilts to a range of community organisations that support adults in need

 Country Forum or to their monthly gathering at the Blackwood Uniting Church.

Program managers who coordinate these programs are grateful for the support of quilters who provide quilts. Regular feedback is received from recipients who express their gratitude after receiving a quilt in often challenging personal situations. Quilts are generally provided to individuals and families who are experiencing health and well-being challenges in their lives, so the major aim is to provide quilts whose fabrics/colours/designs brighten their situations. A budget line within SAQ annual budget provides these three programs access to some funds which allow them to facilitate and organise the making and quilting of additional quilts.

SAQ Affiliated Groups are encouraged to support community groups and organisations of their choice. It is suggested that they develop their own guidelines and vetting procedures to ensure that donated quilts are safe (ie no pins) and meet the designated guideline requirements. SAQ is able to support a limited number of affiliated groups with some funds to purchase bulk polyester batting.

Community Quilt Program leaders have minimal capacity to store donated fabrics and battings. If you have fabrics or batting that you wish to donate to these programs, please contact the secretary by email at secretary.sequilters@gmail.com.



Hello from the Inman Quilters.

It was with a level of excitement on the 17th October 2023, that our President Beth Willson welcomed Jacky Eyre to give a talk on/and display some of her amazing work. Joining us on this 'adventure' were some 35 visitors from Pt. Elliot Patchworkers, Threads, and Sew Whats.

Jacky is an Adelaide girl who became a teacher in her adult life, first in Physical Education, then moving into working with students with special needs. Throughout her working life, marriage and raising two daughters, Jacky also filled her "quiet" moments "having a go" at just about every craft imaginable.

It was in the early 2000's that a chance encounter with a piece of textile work created with antique Japanese fabric,

became a life changing moment. In 2004 Jacky travelled to Japan for the first time with a group of women who were all

quilters - and life has never been the same since!

She has returned to Japan on a regular basis since that first visit (with the exception of the Covid years), amassing a collection of antique textiles – mainly indigo dyed – along with an ever-increasing knowledge and understanding of the history of the textiles and their place in Japanese culture. Through workshop and class participation in Japan, Jacky has continued to learn about stitching techniques, dyeing with indigo, shibori dyeing pattens and even simple Japanese bookbinding.

An incident that clearly depicts the long tradition of Japanese textile, was through a purchase made in Kyoto. The paper bag that her purchase was placed in, advertised the name of the shop and the fact that it had been in the same family for 400 years!!!!

Jacky then told the story behind each of the quilts/wall hangings and other items that she had bought along to show. Her favourite quilt depicts the 3 symbols of winter – plum, bamboo and pine. The items that were handed around were many, varied and were simply amazing.

Following her presentation, guests and IQ members were invited to bring out their "show and tell", followed by a light lunch. A great day was had by all.

Closer to home - in early October, Yankalilla held its Annual Show, with IQ member Christy Smith taking out First Prize for a quilt made for her daughter who is in the Navy, hence the nautical theme. Congratulations in order, Christy.

And a group called Women with Fibre took out First Prize in their category for their amazing Tea Cosy. This group comprises Nancy Duggan, Annie Gator, Anne Cooper, Margaret Morgan and Helen Scholfield. That's quite a group of talent!

The SA Quilters financial and membership year runs from 1 January to 31 December. Members enjoy numerous opportunities to gather, to learn, to become involved in community focused activities and to share their interest in quilt making. The first exhibition 'The Beginnings', displaying 125 items, was convened by Maree Gebhardt. It was held at the Unley Civic Centre in August 1985 and was visited by over 3,000 people. Festival of Quilts continues to be a major annual drawcard for quilters and others. Link to the Festival of Quilts page https://www.saquilters.org.au/festival-of-quilts/

The first *Quilt Encounter*, which was convened by Lessa Siegele OAM, was held at the Red Shield Camp at Victor Harbor in August 1993. Quilt Encounter is held every year and attracts participants from all over the country with local, national and international tutors. In June 1994, the Guild held its first 'non-traditional' juried exhibition 'Dare to Differ' as part of the Guild's ten-year celebrations. Dare to Differ is held every second year and continues to push the boundaries of the art of quilting. Link to the Dare to Differ page https://www.saquilters.org.au/dare2differ/

The *Appraisal Panel* (originally the Valuation Panel) provides a service by volunteer members on behalf of SA Quilters. It was formed on 3rd May 1992 at a meeting convened by Marion Cox and Neta Lewis who had both attended appraisal workshops in NSW. It provides an appraisal service to quilters to have their quilts objectively appraised for replacement by trained appraisers. The Judging Panel, which provides a service by volunteer members on behalf of SA Quilters, was formed in October 1998. The panel consists of trained judges with a knowledge of the craft, skills and techniques involved in all aspects of quilt making. The Little Quilts of Love programme was first convened by Jean Pearce OAM in South Australia in 1996. The group makes quilts specifically for grieving families who have lost a baby in childbirth. The group name was amended to 'Quilts of Love' in 2020 when Jill Clausen, on behalf of member group After Dark Quilters, took on the role of coordinating the programme. At that time the programme embraced providing isolette covers for maternity hospitals and crib/bassinet quilts as well. Country Forum is a bi-annual get together, in Adelaide, of delegates from SA Quilters affiliated member groups. The event is hosted by SA Quilters and enables members to meet and share their quilting experiences. In alternate years a rural group hosts a day of activities, called *Rural Roundup*. PATCHWORK - CAPTURED SHARING

The sharing starts long before we drift out of cars and into the Mannum Bakery at 1 pm to start the Masonic Quilters and Craft Group Retreat: held annually for four days in October. This year we are a group of eleven quilting friends and relations with mixed abilities, experience and personalities all bent on **SHARING** a unique experience.

Let's start with the **S** and that will be **SCRAPS**. We use scraps all the time and several have boxes precut to different sizes but the Queen of Scraps for our group has to be Sue. Her project this year centred on three-inch squares of the layered pineapple pattern with 32 different fabrics for each square – carefully retrieved from boxes of scraps. These scrap boxes also yielded just the right piece for Beryl to rectify a mistake in her calculations. Beryl's quilting project was another transformation of a piece of her friend's beautiful counted cross stitch into a quilt.

Moving on to **H** we have **HELP.**This is available in every direction at all times. Unloading cars, setting up the rooms with our equipment, meal preparation and clean up, the general final clean up, and of course, help with projects and certainly with advice! Help was enthusiastically given to produce a peeper around the aforementioned cross stitch with others sharing in the instruction as it was an unexplored feature for them too.

A is next and we will mention ARRANGEMENT. Jill gave each of us a Bedford style package of pieces to make a quilt. Margaret and others abandoned their planned activity and started to join the pieces given to them. Within hours the pieces had been joined and then we watched as the pin up boards were used to show how varied the quilt could be dependent on the arrangement of the blocks all



made from the same shapes. To add to the fun we now know that we each have a few Christmas pieces with holly on them – so it has become a game of *Spot the Holly*.

R and we are halfway and that stands for **RULES**. We are constantly reminded of these: measure twice or is it thrice (?) cut once! Don't put pins in your mouth! Slide the cover over the blade on the rotary cutter immediately you finish cutting! And one particularly important when working around friends, make sure your coffee is not likely to be knocked over and spoil your neighbour's project!!

I and that will be INVOLVED. Janelle worked on a quilt pattern where the blocks looked like a jigsaw puzzle piece and was a new pattern to all. This meant we were not sure what was happening as the pieces were joined and placed on the wall. We all enjoyed being involved in checking as we watched the pattern emerge.

N is for **NEW**. Pippa is one of our newer members and has shown us several new tricks to make our work neater, quicker and more enjoyable. One of these is a better way to quilt-as-you-go. Julie, Kay and Clare were all using this new approach on their current projects and were pleased with their results. Kay was cleaning up a half-finished project the group had inherited and Julie was doing the rows of houses project. Julie had taken time to personalize with hand sewing each little cottage with plants and animals and when the individual quilt-ed blocks were joined the road between the houses had a perfect line down the middle of the road! Delightful! We had all been pleased with the effect Clare produced when she had previously used the method to join another inherited applique project with animals.

G concludes with **GATHERING.** While we certainly do not want any gathering (or puckering) on our work, A gathering is perfect place for sharing. This year we had visits from another member with a prospective member and family members. We also visited a member's (Julie D) houseboat for one evening meal. Unfortunately Diane had to leave early due to ill health, but not before she shared her striking work with us all – a vivid, colourful Batik, which for me, improved as each of the colours were gathered together to reveal the pattern. Is it too philosophical to compare this to our retreat?

As we gathered again at the bakery we were pleased to have been part of another pleasant and successful retreat.

CORN AND CHEESE MUFFINS

INGREDIENTS:

- One onion, finely chopped
- Four rashes bacon, finely chopped
- · Half cup self-raising flour
- 30 grams butter
- · One cup grated tasty cheese
- · 300 gram can creamed corn
- Third cup of milk
- · One egg, lightly beaten

METHOD:

- · Cook onion and bacon in frying pan until onion is soft. Drain on absorbent paper, cool.
- Sift flour into large bowl, rub in butter, stir in half the cheese and all the bacon and onion
 mixture
- Make well in centre of ingredients, stir in corn, <u>milk</u> and egg. Mix until ingredients are combined.
- Place tablespoons of mixture into greased muffin pans, sprinkle with remaining cheese.
- Bake in moderately hot oven for about 20 minutes, turn onto wire rack to cool.
- Makes 24 delicious muffins.

Helpful Hint

Formula for the removal of pencil marks from quilts.

- 2 Parts rubbing alcohol
- ♦ 1 part water
- 2-3 drops white ivory dishwashing liquid (must be white)
- Rub gently with a soft toothbrush to remove lines
- Soak when finished.






