Quilters' Guild of SA Inc to SA Quilters 1984 - 2024

Throughout 2024, the Communication Team plan to conduct a series of video interviews with just over 20 current SA Quilters who joined the Guild between 1984 and 1990, to compile an informal oral history of their recollections and experiences of the early years of our Guild.

The first video interview was with two of our founding members - Rachel Dettman and Laine Gardner. Rachel was our inaugural President. In this video the two recount their decision to form a Guild for South Australian quilters and what those early years with the Guild involved. One of the projects they discussed was the Quilted Visions exhibition that travelled Australia for several years in the late 1980s. We will showcase more about this exhibition in the coming months. Rachel and Laine created an amazing legacy for those of us who have ever been members of SA Quilters to benefit from and enjoy.

The second video was with the much loved and respected Bronnie Young and Nola Pearce. Nola had two stints as President of the Guild and has been an active member of the Guild for over three decades. Bronnie is known for her passion for hand quilting and her support in supplying quilts and (over 2000) knitted Christmas stockings to numerous community groups. Both have been involved in many country quilting groups and been tutors to hundreds of quilters in our State.

Rachel, Bronnie and Nola are all Life Members of SA Quilters.

Featured Quilter - Michele Hill My Quilting Journey



Is it Michele or Faye with all those curls (1990s)?

I was introduced to the wonderful world of quilting in the mid 1980's when I was looking for a diversion from my role of motherhood and part-time nursing – the rest as they say is history! This hobby led to amazing opportunities that I never expected and it is through my love of appliqué and William Morris that most of this came about.

Coming from a family where Mum sewed our clothes (and everything in between), I just assumed everyone had a sewing machine and learnt to sew! I married in 1978 and 3 years later I enrolled in a handicrafts course with a lady called Daphne Provis who conducted classes in her home. We learnt to make padded picture frames, tissue box covers and heaven forbid hanging toilet roll holders! But we also

had classes in shadow appliqué and cathedral window so the seed was "sewn".

We moved to Happy Valley in 1985 and not long after I participated in classes at Meredith's Homecrafts in Aberfoyle Park

where I met Faye Packham. Our patchwork teacher Jeanette Nichols introduced me to a "Log Cabin Quilt in A Day" the Eleanor Burns way, along with seminole patchwork that adorned my denim skirts. I also made strip quilted jackets for myself and my young daughters who had their own matching jackets (much to their horror now!). There were no rulers with markings available so instead Meredith had plain assorted width perspex rulers made for us. I recall marking lines on the fabric with pencil and cutting strips with scissors, but soon after the very first tiny rotary cutters came on the market. We knew nothing of using 100% cotton for backings or that walking feet existed, so an Actil sheet was used with some very bulky polyester wadding!

In 1987 I took a hand pieced sampler class at Johnsons on Unley Road. We made our own templates from cardboard and our teacher was Lynn Weston who we knew as a co-presenter on a TV show called The Book Place with Brenton Whittle and

the bookworm! In 1989 I enrolled in a class at the Flinders Fibre School at Melrose and it was our tutor Anthea Martin who first introduced me to appliqué and designing your own floral block.

In 1988 I was lucky enough to get into Mitcham Village classes under the expert guidance of Lessa Siegele.....gosh that was 36 years ago! (Thankyou Lessa for our long friendship). Soon after I joined the Quilters Guild of SA and then quilting became a total obsession. I joined committees and helped out in any way I could with exhibitions, Quilt Encounter and the

management team. I think it was in 1990 that I formed Hub Quilters and it is wonderful that they still meet today.

In 1996 I found the need for a break from nursing and Lynn Upill wondered if I might be interested in working for her at Riverlea. I took up her offer and that was really the launch of teaching and creating projects for the magazines of the day including Aust Patchwork and Quilting, Quilters Companion and writing articles for Down Under Quilts. (Thankyou Lyn). 1998 to 2016 I had the privilege of teaching across Australia, New Zealand the UK and even the USA. I also enrolled in every class that I could for myself and during the 1990's that included two tutors from the USA, Harriet Hargreaves at the Barossa Cottage and Nancy Martin as a part of a forum at Finders University. I can also recall doing classes with Margaret Rolfe, Judy Turner, Dianne Finnegan, Lyn Inall, Robyn Ginn and I am sure many others.

It was the raffle prize of airfares to Europe in 1997 that resulted in a life-changing event so I had to resign from Riverlea and go back nursing to save up enough for the rest of the trip (working in a quilt shop was a bit like a child in a lolly shop!). It was on this two week trip that I had my first William Morris 'experience' at the Victoria and Albert Museum in London. When I came home to Adelaide I discovered that our Art Gallery of South Australia has one of the biggest collections of Morris furnishings outside of the UK. So in 2009 I retired from 35 years of nursing and took up a 'new career'- to keep the "genius of Morris alive".

Anna Scott an editor at Country Bumpkin (now Inspirations Studio), saw an opportunity to share my passion so asked if I could write two William Morris appliqué books in 2009 and 2010. At the same time Tim Myers of Curzon Textiles contacted me to ask how I felt about being involved in fabric designing with Jason Yenter of In the Beginning Fabrics, Seattle. That resulted in four successful fabric ranges that were sold in both Australia and overseas.....how crazy is that?

Between 2012 and 2016 I received an invitation to participate in William Morris tours in the UK and in total we enjoyed seven sold out tours. In 2018 I developed "William Morris in Adelaide" tours and these proved to be overwhelmingly pop-

ular so I had to hand over the administration to Renaissance Tours, but I was thrilled that we completed ten of those tours as well.

There are so many people I will be forever grateful to for their encouragement and support including members of SA Quilters and quilters I've met across the state and country. In particular Lessa Siegele, the late Margaret Russell and Roma Good, as well as Raelene Draheim, Bronnie Young, Judy Simcock and Pat Groocock on the farm near Kaniva who aways wanted me to draw more designs! There are so many others who always supported me and I mustn't forget Barb Hallion who told me I needed to have my quilts judged many years ago...that was scary! My very dear friend Faye Packham has always been there for me and the shining star through all of this has to be my long

suffering husband of almost 46 years. Larry is my strength and has batted for me all the way and I will be forever grateful that he came into my life in 1976.



Invitation to join the SA Quilters 40th Birthday Sew Along....

What's it all about (Alfie) I hear you ask?

Since it is SA Quilters 40th birthday it seemed like a good idea to have a little bit of quilting fun, so I have designed a sampler style quilt to celebrate. I use the term "designed" loosely, as I really just chose traditional quilt blocks, and put them together in a quilt.

The blocks are a mixture of 4", 8" and 12" finished square blocks plus three 4" x 8" finished rectangles and you guessed it, drum roll please, there are 40 of them. The blocks will create a quilt which is 40" x 40" finished. Well, it is after all SA Quilters 40th Birthday! You may wish to repeat some of the blocks to create a larger quilt or just add a few borders to create a lap quilt. I've added three borders to mine to make it a lap size 54" x 54".

It's not a mystery quilt, just a sew-along, and is open to anyone who wants to join in the fun.

My palette was bright and huge thanks to Elaine Kennedy for quilting it for me. Three friends have made their version to use my patterns, Sue Knuckey, Cindy Massey and Kay Wilson. A huge thank you to them for making such lovely samples. Sue used a Halloween palette and she quilted her quilt. Cindy chose to do bright scrappy, what else, as she is queen of scraps and Christine Reich quilted her quilt. Kay used shades of aqua and blends and Kay quilted her own quilt.

During 2024, starting now in February, instructions will be on the SA Quilters website with a link to the files plus it will be published each month in I-Patch and on Facebook. The last month, December, will be putting the blocks together. There will be four blocks available each month.

The communications team have set up a Facebook page for everyone to post their progress. Look for "SAQ 40th Birthday Sew Along" on Facebook.

Good luck, I hope you enjoy our 40th Birthday Sew Along and I look forward to you sharing on Facebook.

MONTH ONE – GETTING STARTED

FABRIC REQUIREMENTS

How long is a piece of string...I'm a bit of a "more is always better than less" sort of girl, when it comes to fabric. It works for ice-cream doesn't it? So, I chose 27 fat 1/8th of my favourite fabrics and a background. My fabrics were mostly Alison Glass prints and plains, with Tula Pink small spots and the background is Tula Pink. I didn't use the background in all the blocks so if you choose to do that you will need to have more. Your fabric requirements will be different if you choose not to put borders on, or make different borders to my sample.




- Background fabric, I purchased 3.50 metres and did not have much left over. This included using the background fabric for the first and third borders and the binding.
- 27 fat 1/8ths of your choice of fabric. I had some left over. Small prints are more suitable as some of the pieces are quite small. You can choose light, mediums and darks for your contrast but I just used different colours for my contrast.
- Border fabric Border 1 40cm, border 2 (not checker board like mine) 40cm, border 3 55cm.
- Binding I needed 60cm for the binding.
- Backing and wadding you will of course need these but that will depend on the size of your quilt.

<u>ALSO</u>

- You might find a rotating cutting mat useful; I used my 7"x7" Fiskars rotating mat.
- I always pin my work and find Clover fine pins Code No 2507 (opaque yellow and blue heads) the best, very sharp and very fine, see below.
- I use an awl to tame the ends of triangles to behave at the end of a seam as you are stitching, as in the photo below. You could use a pin or "purple thang".
- There are lots of seams which need to be butted in this quilt and you might find Clover Fork Pins Code No 240 handy. They allow you to keep your seams butted in place, by pinning one pin either side of the seam. These are the only pins I sew over and I do that by turning the fly wheel on the machine by hand, so I can stop and adjust if the needle is about to come down on the pin.
- You may find that with handling, the ends of the seams come apart, using a smaller stitch length than normal will help I used 2.00 length throughout
- You might also find a 6½" square ruler useful.
- I have given you the names of the blocks but don't forget blocks sometimes have more than one name so you might know the blocks by a different name.





CONSTANTS THROUGHOUT THE CONSTRUCTION

- Seam allowance is always ¼" and is included in the cutting instructions
- I press all my seams open as I go so that my block is as flat as is possible, some are quite bulky so it just made sense to spread the bulk
- There are lots of half square triangles included in these blocks. There are several ways to make
 half square triangles so I will detail my method of choice in a separate file called "Getting started making half square triangles". You will of course do what works for you. Also, for the quarter
 square triangles and the flying geese, choose your own favourite method if you prefer not to use
 the instructions included.
- Trim off the "ears" which appear as you construct the blocks
- Colours referred to in the patterns are the colours I chose for my blocks
- Finished size means when the blocks are sewn together

OTHER THINGS TO THINK ABOUT

• I drew up a grid to work out the placement of my fabrics throughout the quilt. Join 4 pages of copy paper together with sticky tape so that you can draw up a grid 40cm x 40cm (then 1cm = 1") - see photo 8



Mark the top and bottom of the page, which will be the top and bottom of the quilt. Draw the grid for the placement of the blocks using the red lines, number the blocks 1 to 40 - see photo 9.

- Don't worry about the coloured lines we will use those in month 11 when we put the blocks together.
- I then used the grid to stick samples of the fabrics I chose to use in each block - see photo 10. This meant I didn't make blocks with the same fabric next to one another and I could spread the colours throughout the quilt. You may not wish to do this but will be happy to let the chips fall where they may, as you make the quilt.

Good luck and on to block 1

MY METHOD OF CHOICE FOR HALF SQUARE TRIANGLES

- When calculating the size of the squares needed to make half square triangles the rule is to add 7/8" to the finished size of the square you require. i.e. for 2" finished half square triangle square, cut the starting squares 2 7/8th. This leaves no room for error, so I like to cut my starting squares 1¼" bigger than the size of my finished half square triangle square. i.e. for 2" finished half square triangles, I cut my starting squares 3¼", there is a little bit of wasted fabric but the finished squares are totally accurate.
- Choose your two fabrics, cut squares the required size, lay them right sides together. Draw a line diagonally from one corner to the opposite corner on the wrong side of one of the fabrics, it makes sense for this to be the plain or lightest fabric see photo 1.
- If you have directional fabric (like my fabric with words used in the quilt) you may wish to think about the corners you choose. For me, each pair of squares will yield two half square triangles with the words travelling in opposite directions. I used a non-directional print for the instructions which follow.

Resize the block to the required size (in the photos that is $1\frac{1}{2}$ ", including seam allowance). Do this by laying the 45° line of a square ruler on the seam (a $6\frac{1}{2}$ " square ruler, or smaller is handy for this) and making sure you have excess fabric to trim away on all sides – see photo 5. If we were not cutting the block back to size, the "ears" would need to be trimmed off.





• Trim two sides – see photo 6 and 6A. 6A is the rotating cutting mat I mentioned



• Rotate the block or the rotating mat (Fiskars 7" in the photo) and trim the other two sides - photo 7



• Two perfectly made and cut 1%" half square triangle blocks which will be 1" finished

This is my preferred method for making accurate half square triangles, as I said earlier you choose your favourite method.

There will be lots of half square triangles in the blocks and this is the way I have made all of them.



MONTH ONE – BLOCK 1 - February

This block is called *CONSTELLATION* and is 8" square finished

Fabric requirements for this block

You will need four fabrics. I chose the background and three other colours – pink print, blue with text and plain blue

- A is background
- B is pink
- C is blue with text



Construction

- Pair one A background square and one B pink square right sides together and construct two half square triangles, cut them back to measure 2½" which will be 2" finished. Repeat with a second pair of A & B squares total four half square triangles.
- Pair one C blue with text square and one D plain blue square right sides together and construct two half square triangles, cut them back to measure 2½" which will be 2" finished. Repeat with a second pair of C & D squares total four half square triangles.
- Pair one A background square and one C blue with text square right sides together and construct two half square triangles, cut them back to measure 2½" which will be 2" finished. Repeat with a second pair of A & C squares total four half square triangles.
- Pair one A square background and one D plain blue square right sides together and construct two half square triangles, cut them back to measure 2½" which will be 2" finished. Repeat with a second pair of A & D squares total four half square triangles.





 Block one complete. It will measure 8½" square and be an 8" finished square



MONTH ONE - BLOCK 2 - February

This block is called *ARKANSAS CROSSROADS* and is 4" square finished

Fabric requirements for this block

I chose the background and three other fabrics – yellow floral, plain orange and green print

- A is yellow
- B is orange
- C is orange
- D is background
- E is green

<u>Cutting</u>

- A yellow cut 4 x 1½" squares
- B orange cut 4 x 1½" squares
- C orange cut 2 x 2¼" squares
- D background cut 2 x 2¼" squares
- E green cut 4 x 1½" squares







Construction

- Lay one D background square right sides together with one C orange square. Draw a line from corner to corner and construct two half square triangles. Repeat with the other two D and C squares. Trim them back to 1½" = four half square triangles
 - Lay the A, B, E and C/D 1¹/₂" squares out as shown



40th BIRTHDAY SEW ALONG

• Join the squares into pairs then rows and then join the rows together

• For accuracy I like to pin my work well with the clover fine pins, or use Clover fork pins



This block is now finished and measures 41/2" square which will be 4" square finished

MONTH ONE – BLOCK 3 - February

This block is a filler block and is a 4" x 8" rectangle finished.

Fabric requirements

Just choose four fabrics you like that contrast well with one another



<u>Cutting</u>

From each fabric chosen cut 1 x (2½" x 4½") rectangle

Construction

Lay them out so they look good next to one another and sew them together to create a $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $8\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle which will be a 4" x 8" rectangle finished

This filler block is pretty simple as are the other filler blocks

MONTH ONE - BLOCK 4 - February

This block is called JEWEL BOX and is 8" square finished

Fabric requirements for this block

You will need 3 fabrics, I chose green spot, plain green and pink floral

A is green spot

B and C are plain green

D is pink floral



<u>Cutting</u>

- A green spot cut 1 x 5¼" square
- $B-plain\ green-cut\ 1\ x\ 5\%''$ square
- C plain green cut 4 x 2½" squares
- D pink floral cut 4 x 2½" squares

Construction

- Pair the A green spot square and the B plain green square right sides together and make two half square triangle blocks, cut them back to measure 4½" square
- Using C and D make two 4½" square four patch blocks as shown above
- Join the elements together to form the block as shown above

This will be an 8½" square which will be an 8" square finished block

McLAREN VALE PATCHWORKERS EXHIBITION Judges Report—January 2024

The SA Quilters Judging Panel were invited to judge the recent McLaren Vale Patchworker's Exhibition. Three judges were involved in the judging.

The quilts were already hanging and judges were asked to provide a Best of Show winner and a Runner Up to Best of Show.

The judges began the day with a walk around the show to view all the quilts before beginning the judging process in ernest.

Beginning at the entry point to the show the judges then began to view all the quilts, taking the time to give each quilt due consideration and discussion as to its merits. Having viewed all entries in this manner there was a list of some 17 quilts deemed worthy of further discussion.

Using the SA Quilters Judges Score sheet, these quilts were all dispassionately viewed and discussed again, being given a mark out of 50, with a maximum of ten points available for five categories.

They are Visual Impact/Eye Appeal, Design, Craftmanship, Quilting, Finish.

- 1. <u>Visual Impact</u> makes a statement, evokes an emotion, wow factor
- 2. <u>Design</u> balance of colour, tone and shape. Suitability of colour and contrast. Colour of thread & embellishments, does anything enhance or detract. Are shapes connected appropriately. Could shapes be improved, achieve better balanced proportion.
- 3. <u>Craftmanship</u> Piecing and or applique, sharp points, even stitching, smooth curves etc. Appropriate colour thread used to piece and or applique. Borders and sashing well constructed and enhance design. Embellishment technique well done. Consider degree of difficulty.
- 4. <u>Quilting</u> compliments the top. Fills the space well and is appropriate for the quilts purpose. Consistent even tension top and back. Consistent and appropriate stitch length and starts/stops not visible. No pleating, puckering, or birds' nests on back.
- 5. <u>Finish</u> Binding or edge treatment and back well done. Binding corners square and stitched down, binding full, consistent width. General appearance clean with no pet hair, stains or distortions, hangs well. No marking lines present.

When the marks were tallied there were six quilts which the judges viewed again to make sure they were comfortable with the results, which they were.

It was noted by the judges that by and large McLaren Vale Quilters bindings were done very well. (This is not always the case in other Quilt shows.)

Every quilt presented for judging was well deserving to be seen in the McLaren Vale Exhibition.
