

This month we are pleased to present our Feature Quilter, Raelene Draheim.

Raelene was President of SA Quilters from 2005 to 2007 and was awarded Life Membership in 2021.



Hello, my name is Raelene Draheim, and I am a long time member of SA Quilters. I don't make it to all Guild meetings these days, but I have served on the Executive Committee, the Judging Panel, and the Appraisal Panel, and am a Past President. I have also attended at least 14 wonderful Quilt Encounters.



I came to quilting in the 80s after a long time interest in colour, fabric and fibre, whilst watching my mother making our clothes and then stitching my own clothes. I had made a few quilts without really knowing how to go about it, (or how to cope with the thick wadding available in the 70s!). A basic course on quilting techniques to make a sampler quilt, and a quilted jacket class pretty much saw the end of my dressmaking - reversible vests, usually decorated, for my husband and myself being the exception for some years.



I love the way a quilt pattern can look so different according to the fabrics and colours chosen. I liked learning different techniques for cutting, stitching, appliqué, quilting, dyeing and printing fabrics etc which soon enabled me to create pictures and tell stories. I became particularly interested in wall hangings and textile art, and enjoyed entering challenges. This interest has continued. I like to use whatever fabric/textile and adornments fit the piece, often recycling or repurposing items. I also enjoy making fabric post cards and notebook/journal covers, the latter being a good way to use samplers and workshop pieces.



Besides quilting and textile art I like to travel and take photos. I enjoy working on my family history, and I am also working to pass the Embroiderer's Guild Certificate course.

Besides SA Quilters, I belong to several other smaller groups and 2 friendship groups. They all provide great companionship, and along with my other interests, keep me challenged! I have exhibited many of my works, won a few awards, taken classes, and coordinated a community wall-hanging. All this as a result of that first quilting class.

Port Elliot Patchworkers News


Port Elliot Patchworkers held their biannual exhibition on 26 and 27 April in the Institute on The Strand in Port Elliot. We had a great turnout on both days with a steady stream of just under 200 visitors.

The exhibition was titled *Quilts n Bags*. Fifty-two quilts were on display including the raffle quilt and two challenge quilts. We forgot to count how many bags were displayed on the tables and quilt frames- whoops! (not to mention the dozens that were sewn for the trading table.











In 2023 it was PEPs turn to host and the subject was 'Fleurieu' with the blocks to measure no larger than 12 x 14 inches. One of PEPs members is also a member of Goolwa Patchers and this group had four large, quilted pieces depicting local scenes that they had acquired. The group had no idea what to do with them so with the suggestion of 'how about donating them to PEP', the group further embellished them and happily handed them over.

The best use of the blocks (as shells, beads and raw edge applique were used on some) was to make it into a wall-hanging. The layout was designed and finished by Rose-Marie Vasiljuk using the leftover cream fabric from the 2025 raffle quilt.

Two of our talented members also donated their time and talents to hold working displays. Katherine makes rope baskets, and rope bags and purses, and also attends local craft markets. Kris Paul who is a quilter and embroidery machine whizz made our queen-sized raffle quilt on her embroidery machine.

Packing a quilt for exhibition:

- Each quilt must be in its own fabric bag (no plastic bags or pillowcases) with the entry number clearly marked in big print and your name (smaller print) on the bag. Further details can be found in the Handbook under Preparing a Quilt for Exhibition (page 10). Rolled quilts, quilts in tubing, or quilts that require special handling, will not be accepted.
- Please find or make a bag that comfortably accommodates the quilt. The bag should totally enclose the quilt. All bags should have strong handles for ease of carrying but keep them simple and not too long.
- Fabric for the bag should be sturdy calico, pre-quilted cottons, furnishing fabrics, preferably in plain colours, which are more easily identified by the handlers, as the identification numbers show up well.
- The ideal bags are available at the SAQ merchandise desk for only \$8. You can purchase one at the June meeting.
- If your quilt is too big for the SAQ bags: Patterns for Large and Extra Large zippered quilt bags can be found on the SA Quilters website here.

Greek Almond Biscuits

INGREDIENTS:

375g almond meal 1 cup caster sugar (200g) ¼ teaspoon almond essence 3 egg whites lightly beaten 1 cup flaked almonds

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Preheat over to 180°
- Grease oven tray
- Combine meal, sugar and essence in large bowl
- Add egg whites, stir to firm paste
- Roll level tablespoons of mix into logs and roll in flaked almonds
- Shape into crescent
- Bake for about 15 minutes



Bookends with the Librarians

Hello again, SA Quilters.


Bookends with Mike has now become **Bookends with the Librarians.**

Jackie, Christine and I are going to share new books to entice you, and old favorites to remind you of some of the golden oldies that become overlooked because of new brighter more colourful books or techniques, which may be as good as the newbies or even better.

If you are like me and like a lot of colour, one of my favourite books is *Karen K. Stone Quilts*. New York Beauty, Orange Peel, Pickle Dish and Clam Shells among others, although she gives them her own names.

Karen talks to the beginning and advanced quilter. There are chapters with hints on fabric and colour, foundation piecing, appliqué, embellishment and quilting.


The book is nicely illustrated with gorgeous colour photos of the quilts. Easy to understand diagrams and pattern pieces help to achieve an intricate quilt with not a lot of fuss.



Quilt It Crochet It! by Jemima Flendt is another overlooked book in our library. Seven colorful designs in a quilted version and a crochet version of the same quilt. Start with smaller projects like Log Cabin potholders and cushions and work your way into simple quilts with squares to half square triangles. There is a beautiful neutral baby quilt using applique circles. All the quilts then have their crochet version to challenge your skills.

There are clear photos of the quilts and the crochet projects. If you are an all-thumbs crochet person like myself Jemima has included sections of how-to crochet photos and diagrams with each project to help you along the way. Basic quilting and tips also follow through the book to help new quilters get great results.

The final project is a fat quarter pillow set that combines both skills. A great way to use both or learn a new technique to add to your repertoire.



Hold up your hands all you Kaffe Fassett lovers. I am bringing in a few of his "Quilting in..." books to fill in some of the gaps we have, but his latest book *Kaffe Fassett's Timeless Themes* is both_new and reflective of old prints and patterns. The Kaffe Fassett Collective consists of three designers; Brandon Mably, Phillip Jacobs and Kaffe Fassett all designing under the Kaffe Fassett Collective for the past 30 years.


Kaffe goes on a journey back through time looking at a lot of their old classic fabrics in their archives. He talks a lot about how the three of them have taken motifs from carpets, textiles, pottery and wall decorations from cultures all over the world and over many years of travel and collecting and looking at what other cultures are wearing. The book is lavishly photographed illustrating a lot of the found objects and how the colours and prints ended up in fabric.

Part one of the book is broken up into themes in old and new quilts, old and new fabrics: Bold Stripes, Complex Stripes,

Circles, Vases, Baskets & Bowls and other themes that will be familiar to Kaffe Lovers.

Part two are the instructions for the quilts. Like all his books simple instructions and diagrams fill each page for the beginning quilter or the more experienced.

Registration forms must be returned by 13th June.





Opening hours are daily 1pm to 4pm, the attached photo is a sample of what's on show.







Workshop Report - Stitch Sampler on Felt

On Saturday 10th May, 16 enthusiastic students sat surrounding tutor Jill Christian, absorbing every word as she gave a fact filled overview of the different kinds of stitches that stitchers of today can use to enhance their work. Jill covered a range of topics, from needle types and range of threads to the many ways in which simple stitch techniques can be used to create different outcomes.

Throughout the day Jill divided the class into small groups around her table where she showcased specific stitch techniques, allowing students to watch close up and ask lots of questions.

Jill provided each student with copious and detailed notes to reinforce and extend the knowledge and skills learnt throughout the class.

While Jill fed students' urge to learn, Workshop Angels Heather, Coralie and Chris made sure that tummies were well fed throughout the day.

An interesting Restoration Project undertaken by Jacqui Fanning

Jacqui is a member of McLaren Vale Quilters

I have recently completed the restoration of an old hexagon quilt of which was originally the property of Pat and Vera Cook of London and Yorkshire.

The quilt was made during World War 2 and came into its current owner's possession 35 years ago when it was swapped for a crochet rug.

The quilt perhaps doesn't qualify as a quilt as it has no batting and there are no quilting stitches between the top and the backing. The top hangs loose from the backing. The top has been slip stitched around its edge onto the backing with black thread.

While some of the hexagons appear to have been paper pieced quite a few are a bit more free hand and are less of a regular hexagon shape, which would suggest that they were not paper pieced but were free hand cut and stitched. Some seams which have come apart are not butted together but are underlapped with the adjacent piece, which would seem to indicate that some weren't paper pieced.

The fabric of the hexagons is an absolute mixture of weights textures and thickness. There are silky fabrics reminiscent of lingerie from an earlier era, alongside pieces of woven tweed, woven check, suiting, gingham, floral cottons and upholstery weight fabrics. It truly is a scrap quilt.

Upon first inspection I thought I saw about 10 or 12 hexagons which were an orange stripe fabric, were rotted and needed repair. So I offered to do a 'bit of a repair'. Upon closer inspection I became aware that there were a lot of fabrics which were literally barely hanging by a thread, and I have now replaced over 70 hexagons, being careful not to catch the backing in the stitching, leaving the front free floating as it was. I replaced each damaged hexagon with fabric of a similar weight and colour.

Once I found one hexagon of a particular colour which needed restoration, a look over the quilt showed almost every patch of that same fabric was also rotted. Conversely one of the most commonly occurring fabrics on the quilt was utterly rotted in some sections but remained unaffected in others which led me to think that at some stage it may have been folded while exposed to the sun as the damaged fabric hexagons of that fabric were mostly all together.

Some of the outer hexagons at two of the corners are from a very much different fabric, mostly solid coloured broadcloth and the stitching style is quite different. The stitches are large, uneven and sewn with a coarse black thread. The difference in the stitch sizes and colour of the fabrics and colour of the threads used, leads me to believe that the original hexagon top was produced by one person (unfinished) and that a second person finished the top by adding the broadcloth hexagons, the coarser black thread stitching and hemmed it onto a sheet.





Exhibition Theme: This exhibition features 24 innovative, monochrome-themed art quilts that explore the nuances of pure colour, while also showcasing the artists' diverse creativity, techniques and styles. Join us in celebrating the beauty of pure colour and the endless possibilities it holds within the world of textile art.

Between Black and White, delves into the nuances of pure colour by exploring the infinite colour possibilities that lie between black and white. From vibrant hues to subtle shades, this very challenging theme celebrates the variety of tones found within each of the 24 pure colours that were derived from a colour wheel designed by Joen Wolfrom.

Background to the Member Challenge: The contributing artists selected their favourite hue from the 24 available. They were welcome to use as many shades and tints found on their designated card. The artists were also challenged to conform to the same portrait orientation, size (33 cm wide by 83 cm high, +/- 1 cm) and to exclude pure black or white from their materials. However, they were able to use any technique or subject matter, provided the art piece was still considered an art quilt, that in our definition is "two or more layers stitched together and consisting predominately of fibre".

The exhibition features 24 different individual monochrome studies, that transition across the gallery walls and represents the full spectrum of rainbow derived colours. Each artwork offers a unique perspective of the theme, as each artist was able to explore their chosen colour by utilising their preferred unique interests and techniques. Group subject matter therefore ranges from abstract to nature inspired.

Quilting/Life Balance by Ally Baum

Nick Cave is one of my favourite singers. He has remained a consistent part of my life since I first saw "The Ship Song" video on Rage early one Saturday morning, in my teenage years. While his guitar and piano talents amaze me, it's his lyrics that keep me coming back for more. For the past 7 years, I have eagerly awaited Nick Cave's "Red Hand Files" emails hitting my inbox. Fans write into Nick asking random questions, to which Nick takes the time to publish a response to as many questions as possible. This weeks email had me thinking about my own creativity. The question, posed by John, from Wellington, New Zealand, and Nick's reply were:

How do you manage to balance your creative life with your family commitments? I've been a 'hobby' painter for years, but since the first COVID lockdown, I have taken it way more seriously and have reached a point where it's all I want to do. I'm genuinely thrilled by what is happening at the end of the brush, but I am increasingly aware of the cost of hours and hours spent in my shed rather than with my wife and son. My desire to create feels like a compulsion, and I'm struggling to work out whether it's the purpose of my life or some kind of mental illness. I'm in my 50s and still have a real job. I'm realistic about the unlikelihood of ever being able to paint full-time. But I believe, as much as I believe in anything, that this is the real thing and is of value. I want to spend every hour I can exploring this world. Any thoughts you have would be very welcome.

Dear John,

Often questions come in to The Red Hand Files that I don't feel I have the authority, expertise, or even understanding to address. Of course, this doesn't always stop me from attempting to respond, but it does give me pause. I had no such trouble with your question, John. I completely identified with it, and I know how to answer it. I am an expert in these matters.

You have a wife, a son, a shed, and a creative compulsion – what could possibly go wrong? My office was your shed, it was separate from the house and I would spend most of my time there. The house felt like a well-established and settled place, while the office was a mysterious and magical realm, a place where I transformed into the person I always believed I was meant to be.

You brilliantly capture the sensation of being inside the breathless rush of the creative process, where time holds no sway and the whole world seems to crystallise into a written word or a stroke of paint. Compulsive and charged with a devilish energy, you feel in your very bones that this is what you were destined to do.

You wonder whether this is a mental illness. I believe it is. The artistic impulse is an exquisite derangement – like drugs, like love, like faith, like grief – a complete and full-force commandeering of the body and the heart. It is a kind of possession, a thrilling seduction, an enchantment, as the ink and paint flow and dance. So demonically exhilarating is this sensation that we think – "This must be the purpose of life!"

But, John, it is not.

The creative urge is a gift not afforded to everyone, and those of us who possess it bear a responsibility to pursue that impulse wholeheartedly. However, there are other duties beyond those at the tip of your brush or nib of my pen – beautiful and sacrificial fidelities. You have committed to your wife and son to offer them more than just the crumbs of yourself, the dreas of what remains of you after a day with the devil in the shed.

You are in service to your creative impulses – and by the same token to God – but you are also in service to the world as it presents itself, and to those entrusted to you. This is a point of honour. It is with a hard-earned understanding, and the most profound regret, that I can tell you that no artistic endeavour, no matter how sublime it may appear, is worth denying your family or sacrificing those in your care.

My advice, John, is to cherish your wife and love your child with all your heart, and then go to your shed – in that order. I'm saving you a world of heartache, my friend. In the years to come, you will thank me.



Love, Nick


I can sympathise with John, from Wellington. My love for quilting, the hobby that we all share, can sometimes consume me. The need to be creative can be overwhelming. I am late to social events, put off doing the housework, forget to go outside and enjoy the sunshine, or sew late into the night, when I should be in bed. I sit glued to my machine, only getting up to iron my latest seam. The need to find a balance of the hobby that I love, and the rest of my life, is important.

I am lucky that my hobby had taken over my living room before my partner, Darragh, moved into our house, so we've normalised eating dinner around, what he calls, "the invasion of the threads". Whilst my sewing is strewn over the living room table. My design wall hangs on the living room wall, so I can constantly assess or critique the progress of my latest project(s) and judge the accuracy of my points. I am able to assess if the mis-sew I have stewed over up close, will really be worth that much consideration when viewed from afar. This invasion into our living room, means that visitors are able to judge projects before I have deemed them ready for public consumption. The ironing board, also a regular fixture, is only put away when I'm expecting guests, but I rarely use it to iron clothes.

I dream of turning a room in the house into a dedicated sewing room. The room where I currently spend 30—40 hours a week in front of the computer or on zoom calls, or the room that provides a comfy bed for my mum, family, or friends visiting from the country. However this week's Red Hand Files reminds me that I should be grateful for what I have, and careful for what I wish for. I love being able to sew my current project while sharing with Darragh, a living room, a bottle of red, and the footy on the TV. Sharing space in the living room keeps my creative hobby from turning into an "exquisite derangement" and a "full-force commandeering of the body and the heart" like it has the potential to do. I am going to remember to "cherish [my family] and love [my friends] with [all my] heart, and then go to [my sewing space] – in that order".
