President's Report

It is with much pleasure that I present the 2024 President's Annual Report for the Quilters' Guild of SA, also known as SA Quilters. Membership in 2024 was 550 individual members and 89 affiliated groups.

For the benefit of our members, the **key aims** of the Guild are

- To promote patchwork and quilting
- To provide a forum for South Australian quilters
- To encourage the formation and maintenance of quilters' groups
- To hold, organize and take part in exhibitions and workshops
- To provide information, knowledge and skills with regard to quilt making

2024 was a significant year for SA Quilters with our 40th Birthday celebrations, along with the foreshadowing of celebratory activities planned throughout the following months, being launched at the March meeting. The Quilters Guild of SA (Inc) held its first meeting in March 1984, with Rachel Dettman our first elected President. At the 2024 March meeting a new SAQ banner was released – designed by Jane Polden.

The theme for Festival of Quilts was 'Ruby Red', their challenge was '40', the theme for Quilt Encounter was 'Dazzling Rubies' and Heather Ford designed a multi month sew-along focusing on 40 pieced blocks.

Attendance at monthly **SAQ meetings** was strong throughout 2024, with attendances of close to 100 members at each meeting. I offer sincere thanks to the **Meetings Team**, made up of Wendy Hunt (Team Leader), Rosanne Fuller, Chris O'Brien, Jill Christian, Heather Ford, Jackie Harris, Ros Wyatt, Peggy Argent, Margaret Hurrell, Denise Johnston, Gaylene Morgan, Diane Lewitzke, and Julie Symons who met on a regular basis to formulate plans to ensure our monthly meetings ran smoothly. Thanks also to Carolyn Thurtell in her role as Kitchen Angel and Nola Pearce as her helper, serving members a cuppa at monthly meetings. Thanks also to Librarian, Michael Barton and Assistant Librarian, Jackie Harris who have kept the **Library** ticking over for members to access books at our monthly meetings.

A very successful **Market Day** was hosted at the Adelaide West Uniting Church in May by the **Events Team**. 35 vendors provided ample retail opportunities for nearly 300 visitors. Thank you to the organising team and kitchen staff, led by June Yam, for a quilter's bargain quilt supplies shopping day.

Thanks to Rosslyn Wyatt the **Workshops** convenor and team members Peggy Argent, Heather Ford, Jill Christian and Wendy Hunt who oversaw a busy and successful workshop programme for the year. Workshops were well attended and were presented by Lessa Siegele, Faye Packham, Jill Christian, Wendy Whellum, Sue Knuckey, Julie Nixon, Chris O'Brien, Cindy Massey, Bronwyn Cant and Jemima Flendt. Thank you to those members who supported these workshops and the tutors for their inspiring teaching.

The **Communications Team** of Kathleen Rossini (Team Leader), Cindy Massey, Chris O'Brien, Jane Polden, Ally Baum, Rhoda Ryan and Tina Robson have worked tirelessly to keep our members informed and entertained. On behalf of us all I would like to thank them for their dedication and many, many hours of work across all our digital platforms, particularly for their promotion of SA Quilter's 40th birthday activities and celebrations.

I-Patch continued its significant role in facilitating SAQ communication with our members and now reaches the inbox of over 900 recipients. Members are kept up to date with news from SA Quilters, groups, shops and the wider quilting community. Our thanks go to those affiliated groups who contributed to a greater understanding of what happened across quilting communities throughout the State with their activity reports.

The **SAQ Facebook Page** is certainly an effective method of notifying our individual and affiliate members of SAQ news and information together with items of interest from the wider quilting world, including our member shops and groups. Reactions have been recorded from across the globe. A new Facebook Group was created for those quilters following along with Heather's Sew Along to share their journeys.

The **SA Quilters YouTube Channel** holds an amazing array of videos, including sewing room visits, interviews and tutorials. Cindy and Jane have developed a high profile not only locally but nationally with their sewing room visits. Throughout 2024, Kathy and Chris interviewed SAQ members who played key roles in the creation and expansion of SA Quilters and our quilting community over the decades. These

videos are crucial archival records of the history and back stories of our Guild.

The **SA Quilters Website** has continued to be an important means of information communication with our members and interested others. Thank you to Kathleen Rossini for her hours of work in keeping our website dynamic, as well as her continued maintenance of the site, which is a mine of information.

Thank you to our **archivist** Candy Walker who oversees the 40 years of accumulated SAQ history. Candy continues to develop the digital archive and can provide a myriad of details to anyone who needs it.

The SAQ **Finance Team**, led by Ann Ewer, has again closely monitored the budget. I would like to acknowledge the outstanding commitment and contribution of Keith Holland, our **Honorary Treasurer** and Jan Goulter the **Assistant Treasurer** in ensuring SA Quilter's financial well-being. **Insurance** continues to be a big expense for SAQ and I thank Margaret Hurrell for continuing to liaise with the insurance broker, our groups and individual members with regard to insurance matters.

The Governor, Her Excellency the Honorable Frances Adamson AC and her husband Mr Rod Bunten are our joint **Patrons**. Both attended the Festival of Quilts venue the day before it opened in order to review the exhibited quilts and select the Patron's Award. Her Excellency was the special guest presenter at our Festival of Quilts Awards Presentation the following evening. In November Rosanne Fuller, Di Bessell, Sonia Holton and Bev McBride represented SA Quilters at an official garden party in the grounds of Government House where they were able to meet and chat with the Governor.

Quilt Australia (formerly Australian Council of Quilters), a group made up of representatives of all the State and Territory Guilds, met via Zoom on two occasions. SAQ was represented by Heather Ford, Gaylene Morgan, Ann Ewer, Rosanne Fuller and Chris O'Brien. Many topics were discussed and this continues to be a valuable method of sharing information among States and Territories.

The National Coordinator indicated that after more than two decades she was stepping down from her role and that representatives would need to discuss the future of Quilt Australia going forward.

Scholarships, Country Grants and City Grants were announced at the AGM in May. Grants were awarded to:

Scholarships: Julie Symons to attend AQC and participate in two workshops.

Country Grants: Barmera Lake Bonney (Rural Roundup 2024), Kapunda Quilters (replacing the Kapunda High School Centenary Quilt), Pirie Quilters (workshop), Port Augusta Quilters Guild (exhibition), Shared Stitches of Mannum (exhibition). Congratulations to all these groups

City Grants: This is the first year of the City groups grants scheme and there was one application. Purple Patch Quilters (backing fabric for isolette covers for NICUs)

Frame Hire continues to not be as active as in previous years. Thanks to Angela Yeates, Frame Hire Liaison Officer and David Hart, Frame Hire Checker for facilitating this service offered to our member groups and individual members.

2024 saw SA Quilters again team up with **Craft Alive** to hold a very successful **Festival of Quilts** in July at the Showgrounds. The theme was "Ruby Red", in celebration of SAQ's 40th birthday. Thanks to the exhibitors, sponsors and all the many volunteers who worked to make it a success, but especially the Festival of Quilts Team. The Team consisted of Ann Ewer (Team Leader), Jan Goulter, Margaret Hurrell, Jennifer Kempson, Wendy Hunt, Jill Iveson, Carmel Loughry, Rosanne Fuller, Christa Mano, Chris O'Brien, Rhoda Ryan, Ann Shuttleworth, Carmel Wauchope and Di Bessell, all of whom worked tirelessly to make it a huge success.

Quilt Encounter was held in September at the Stamford Grand Hotel in Glenelg. As always thanks must go to the participants, teachers, sponsors and shops but especially the QE team consisting of Kerry Brand (Team Leader), Joyce Chapman, Ros Holmes, Sonia Holton, Bev McBride, Cindy Massey, Jane Polden, Margaret Sampson, Carmel Wauchope and Jan Huckel who spend months each year juggling workshops, tutors, participants, travel arrangements and more, while planning and organising this amazing event. The Team also hosted the 2024 On the Couch evening with Sue Spargo and Jen Kingwell. Thank you, Team, for once again hosting an amazing and very successful QE event.

Dare to Differ was not held in 2024 but held over to 2025 to bring it back into line with the uneven years as was the case pre-covid disruption. Sue Knuckey has taken over as Team Leader for Dare to Differ. Thank you, Sue.

An extremely successful **Rural Roundup** was held in 2024, successfully hosted by the Barmera Lake Bonney Quilters. Congratulations to Julie Plush and her team.

Modern Mix, the SA Quilters Modern Quilt Group continued to meet to share modern quilting ideas, techniques, inspiration and challenges. Team leader Jill Radcliffe, with a steering group of Cindy Massey, Lesley Miller, Michael Barton and Sue Knuckey organised activities, a workshop and guest speakers during the year at the Cumberland Park Community Centre. A glance at the group's Facebook page shows the enthusiasm of all those who attend this group. Thank you to Jill and her team for inspiring this SAQ group.

2024 was another successful year for our Sit and Sew groups who meet at Vermont Church.

The Unplugged Stitchers led by Jackie Harris, are the hand sewers who meet on the first Wednesday each month.

Sew It's Wednesday, led by Cindy Massey, Jane Polden & Jo Reardon are both hand and machine sewers and meet on the second and fourth Wednesday each month.

Saturday Starz, led by Therese May are both hand and machine sewers and meet on the fourth Saturday each month.

All groups have seen an increase in attendance over the year. Lots of happy times, with friendship, laughter and food is had by all. Thank you to the Team Leaders and all who support these groups.

The **Appraisal Team** meets bi-monthly on the Friday after SAQ Meetings, beginning in February. They met five times in 2024, during which time 79 quilts were appraised with a combined replacement value of \$390,215.00. Team Leader is Heather Ford, Gaylene Morgan (Secretary), Sue Wege (Computer Data), Caroline Thurtell (morning tea angel). There are 14 qualified appraisers: Bronwyn Savage, Carolyn Thurtell, Chris Beauchamp, Cindy Massey, Gaylene Morgan, Heather Ford, Judy Carter, Kathleen Rossini, Nola Pearce, Patricia Grocock, Sue Wege, Tina Robson, Vicki Hart and Wendy Hunt with Sarah Addis joining as a trainee in June 2024. Thank you, Team, for all that you do to support our members.

The **Judging Team** enjoyed the opportunity to judge at 7 different locations throughout 2024 and continued to enhance their skills with various education days. Thank you to those groups who have used the services of the Judging Panel in the past, and group exhibition organisers are

encouraged to have their shows judged using the services of our trained and experienced judges.

Four meetings were held through the year starting with an Education/Training day, led by Team Leader Jill Christian, on writing Judge's Reports. The Judging Team comprises Jill Christian, Judy Carter, Heather Ford, Julie Haddrick, Emilie Knight, Bronwyn Savage and Carolyn Thurtell with Chris Beauchamp, Marett Hancox and Gaylene Morgan in training.

SA Quilters supports several groups to facilitate the making and distribution of quilts within our community.

After Dark Quilters, a city-based SAQ affiliated group, represented by Jill Clausen, manages the **Quilts of Love** program and Chris O'Brien maintains the **Flinders' Kids** project. **Comfort Quilts** continued its important work supporting a range of community organisations, particularly palliative care providers. Heartfelt thanks to the Team Leaders, the hard-working groups and to everyone who help in the making of these very much appreciated quilts.

We are very appreciative of the support SA Quilters receives from our major sponsor **Bernina Australia** who in 2024 continued to support Festival of Quilts and Quilt Encounter. Christina Kasiz from **Melann's Fabrics** in Dernancourt continued to support SA Quilters as a major sponsor. Sincere thanks to Christina.

There are many others who support SAQ with **sponsorship** of Festival of Quilts, Quilt Encounter, Dare to Differ, Country Forum and Rural Roundup including local and interstate quilt shops, sewing machine retailers, quilting wholesalers, SAQ affiliated groups and individual SAQ members. We thank you all for your much-appreciated generosity.

Now to you - **our members**. You are why we, some 70+ volunteers who keep our organisation ticking along, put in the time and effort we do during the year to organise all the above activities for you to enjoy. We thank you for the support you have shown during another amazing year.

Last but by no means least, a huge thank you to the wonderful Leadership Team who have supported me once again during this last year. I could not have fulfilled my role as President without the encouragement and enthusiasm of you all. Thanks also to everyone who has worked to make everything run smoothly. We have had

loads of fun and laughter and shared much chocolate while still getting the serious stuff done.

In 2024 SA Quilters was managed by a **Leadership Team** of 16 elected members. President (Chris O'Brien), Leadership Team Members, Guild Members, Friends and Guests. I present to you the Audited Financial statements of **Quilters' Guild of South Australia Inc.** for the year ended 31st December 2024.

For the 2024 financial year the **Guild** achieved a Net Surplus of \$3,0529.54 (an increase of \$2,0475.42 over the last financial year). The Net Surplus is a pleasing result that was due to the financial performance of the various **Guild** groups. The Leadership Team together with the Guild Groups need to be acknowledged for their efforts in 2024. Every group activity of your **Guild** had a surplus for the year and together with the increase in Interest Income made for the 2024 Surplus.

Report on the Financial Report

I have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of THE QUILTERS GUILD OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA INC. (the association) which comprises the Balance Sheet as at 31st December 2024, and the Income Statement for the year ended 31st December 2024, a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes and the statement by members of the committee.

Committee's Responsibility for the Financial Report

The committee of the association is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report and have determined that the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, which form part of the financial report, are consistent with the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act SA 1985 and are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The Committee's responsibility also includes establishing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report that is free from material misstatement whether due to fraud or error, selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies, and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on my audit. No opinion is expressed as to whether the accounting policies used, as described in Note 1, are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. I conducted my audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. These Auditing Standards require that I comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditors consider internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

In common with organisations of this type, it is not practical to establish adequate records or controls over cash receipts prior to their receipt and entry in the accounting records. Accordingly, my audit of cash receipts was limited to the amount recorded in the accounting records of the Association.

Team Annual Reports 2024

Appraisal Team

This is the Annual Report for the Appraisal Team of SA Quilters from January 1st to December 31st, 2024.

The Team comprises Team Leader - Heather Ford, Secretary - Gaylene Morgan, Computer Person - Sue Wege, Morning Tea Angel - Caroline Thurtell.

There are 14 qualified appraisers, this includes Bronwyn Savage, Carolyn Thurtell, Chris Beauchamp, Cindy Massey, Gaylene Morgan, Heather Ford, Judy Carter, Kathleen Rossini, Nola Pearce, Patricia Grocock, Sue Wege, Tina Robson, Vicki Hart and Wendy Hunt with Sarah Addis joining as a trainee in June 2024. The Team meets bi-monthly on the Friday after Guild Meetings, beginning in February.

In 2024, the Team appraised 79 quilts for a total value of \$390,215.00.

In March, the Team travelled to Aldinga to appraise their quilts.

A successful retreat for members was held at Mannum, in May, offering professional development and appraisal of the members quilts.

A professional development exercise saw members all make two quilt blocks with blue and white fabric supplied. Everyone timed their processes from start to finish. Collation of results showed a wide variation in times taken and an average time for making the blocks resulted. More blocks were made and then all were put together with borders by Heather Ford to create a quilt top. Kathleen Rossini quilted the quilt, and it was appraised for replacement at \$4,150.00. The quilt was donated to SA Quilters Festival of Quilts as the raffle quilt for 2025.

Our Team provides appraisal services for both members and non-members, recognising the value of your work and materials. We look forward to assisting you in appraising your quilts in the future.

Communications Team

The Communications Team comprises seven members – Cindy Massey, Chris O'Brien, Jane Polden, Ally Baum, Rhoda Ryan, Tina Robson, Rosanne Fuller and Kathy Rossini. Rosanne joined the team and Rhoda left the team to continue her role with Festival of Quilts in 2024. Chris, Cindy, Rosanne and Kathy are also members of the SA

Quilters Leadership Team. Cindy and Jane are also on the Quilter Encounter Team. The Committee is actively supported by the SA Quilters Leadership Team and other SA Quilters Teams.

The Team is responsible for the management of I-Patch, Facebook, Instagram, YouTube and the SA Quilters web site.

I-Patch

I-Patch continues to keep members up to date with all SA Quilters notices, reports, activities, advertising and quilting related events statewide, nationally and internationally. Cindy and Jane have continued their very active role of video visits with members and Chris and Kathy have shared the role of video visits throughout 2024, to sit down with those inaugural SA Quilters members to memorialise their stories in the organisation's 40th year.

All editions of I-Patch reside on a secure page on the SA Quilters web site and is not listed on the main menu and not available to the public (it is an unpublished page). The link is sent to recipients including SA Quilters Members, Affiliated Groups, National and State Guilds and members of Affiliated Groups who opt in to receive I-Patch. Each edition is lodged online with the National eDeposit. Ally remains the primary editor of I-Patch. There has been a marked take-up in advertising by members and shops and Affiliated Groups advertising their exhibitions.

Facebook

Members of the Communications Team have the required level of permission to post, edit, monitor, moderate and delete on the SA Quilters Facebook page. Facebook continues to be a valuable communication tool for members through posting notices of workshops, interesting quilting related information and advertising for our affiliated groups and member shops.

SA Quilters page has 5,356 followers of which 96.4% are women and 3.6% are men. There were 2,084,244 views on the SA Quilters Facebook page during 2024 with 46% of the views from followers and 54% from non-followers. Associated Facebook pages are also established for SA Quilters Comfort Quilts, SA Quilters Flinders Kids, Modern Mix SA, SA Quilters Sit and Sew and, in 2024, SA Quilters 40th Anniversary Sew Along.

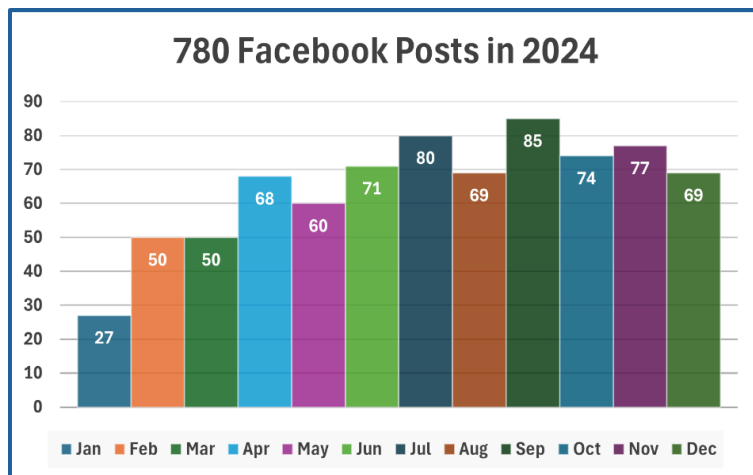
There was a total of 780 posts to the SA Quilters Facebook page in 2024.

SA Quilters web site

The SA Quilters web site address is <https://www.saquilters.org.au/>.

The web site is progressively updated with advice from the various Team Leaders. The site is a repository for photos and slideshows from events such as Quilt Encounter, Dare to Differ and Festivals of Quilts, Country Forum, Rural Roundup and Sit and Sews. It also holds administrative information in relation to membership, Annual Reports and forms and policies. New pages for one-off events are established and removed as required, eg Market Day and Mystery Bus Tour.

Pages were established in 2024 to commemorate the 40th Anniversary of SA Quilters with a page detailing the history and a page for a 40th Birthday Sew Along quilt which was designed by Heather Ford.

The web site was populated by and is managed by Kathy with backup from Tina.

Community Quilts

Comfort Quilts

An enthusiastic group of Comfort Quilt quilters met on the first Saturday of the month at the Blackwood Uniting Church Hall, under the team leadership of Jan Strachan. Our sincere thanks are extended to Kate Seinor who unfortunately had to step down from her previous role as Team Leader and to Jan Strachan for stepping up. We appreciate all that Kate and her team accomplished since taking over this role.

The group made good use of donated fabrics to piece together tops that were then forwarded to one of their members, who happily longarm quilted them. Binding was a shared activity. Over 200 quilts were donated, close to double the efforts of the previous year.

Mary Potter Hospice was the main recipient of Comfort Quilt's donations. During the year, Angela Henwood and myself, as representatives of the team, were invited to a morning tea at Mary Potter to acknowledge our contribution to the hospice. Staff recounted situations in which the value of these quilts to recipients and their families, experiencing end of life situations, was incalculable. Families of those who had been recipients of donated quilts reinforced the appreciation felt when quilts were provided for comfort and to add colour to the seemingly sterile environment of a hospice ward.

Towards the end of the year Carolyn Daniels fostered the identification and sourcing of additional client groups, setting up records to equally distribute available quilt resources. Angela also created a strong link with the palliative care unit at Flinders Medical Centre, with staff willing to collect quilts directly from her. The team were also able to supply quilts to Coolock House, the Cancer Council's Greenhill Lodge, the Australian Migrant Resource Centre, the Salvation Army at Marion and Ronald MacDonald House.

Flinders Kids

2024 was a bumper year for quilters supplying our programme with quilts for the children's ward at Flinders Medical Centre. It is timely to acknowledge the efforts of both individual quilters as well as the city and country groups who have been able to provide a steady supply of quilts.

We can be assured that we have put a smile on the faces of many children with the range of absolutely delightful quilts that have been delivered on a regular basis throughout the year. Not all quilts that we are given are suitable for young children – we ask that quilters provide bright, cheerful quilts for youngsters experiencing a range of chronic health issues – and some were passed on to other community quilt groups. The majority of children in the ward tend to be under 4 years of age, so we have had regular requests for quilts made from popular fabrics such as Bluey and Frozen. A huge thank you to those quilters who sourced such fabrics and made some delightful quilts.

The staff of the children's ward continue to stress the difference that these quilts make to the ambience within the ward. Last year we delivered 328 quilts, this year 400. However, at year's end we had over 100 quilts undelivered, so in reality 500+ quilts were provided by our wonderful quilters.

We said a sad, retirement farewell to our liaison nurse at FMC in November and have fingers crossed that an equally passionate staff member will continue the relationship that we have maintained for many years.

Thank you everyone who participated in this valuable community quilts programme.

Requests for Isolette covers for Lyell McEwin Hospital have continued to be slow but I've spoken with the Nurse Unit Manager who will monitor their supply.

We continue to supply Helen Mayo House with 32" square quilts to be used as play mats for the babies while in their care. This unit provides care for Mums who have either post-natal depression or mental health issues. Mums and babies are often there for weeks, and the play mats are very much appreciated by both Mums and staff.

Purple Patches are now making pouches and small quilts for the Birthing and Assessment Unit at the W&CH for babies who are stillborn or die shortly after birth.

We now have a strong focus on ensuring all quilts received are distributed as soon as possible and this has enabled us to maintain only a very small supply.

Special Exhibits

1. Rachel Dettman, the first President of SA Quilters, displayed 8 of her beautiful hand quilted quilts.

3. The Embroiderer's Guild of SA – presented a beautiful display of different types of perfectly stitched embroidery, including a large tablecloth featuring different styles of stitching.

Group Liaison

In 2024 we had a new group join SA Quilters making 89 groups in total. Of those 36 were city groups and 53 country groups. At the 2024 AGM six groups received \$500 grants from SA Quilters for various projects.

There were quite a few very successful exhibitions held by groups, some of whom invited the Judging team to either judge their exhibition or use the exhibition as a training opportunity for their trainee judges. The Judging Team continue to offer their expertise to groups. The Appraisal Team also offered to visit groups to do talks and appraise quilts.

Burra Quilters shared their beautiful work as a special exhibit at Festival of Quilts 2024.

Thank you to the Barmera Lake Bonney Quilters who hosted a very successful Rural Roundup on Saturday 26th October 2024 at the Field Days venue with about 160 attending, four shops, lots of fun quilting experiences and networking. Along with attending Rural Roundup and the Riverland International Quilters Day event, the Leadership Team were invited to join other groups in their activities which has been a lot of fun for everyone. Please keep the invites coming in.

Inman Valley Quilters have volunteered to host the 2026 Rural Roundup event.

Groups were encouraged to share their activities at Guild meetings and in I-Patch. We had a couple of groups share at Guild meetings and lots of groups submit articles for I-Patch. If groups are not confident in submitting an article, the Communication Team will put one together if the group sends in the text and pictures for the article. Groups were also encouraged to use SA Quilters social media pages to advertise their events, especially exhibitions, which many groups did.

Eight groups took up the opportunity to be involved in a Sisters Group link up.

Groups Liaison:

Groups News newsletters have been sent out to groups electronically on an as need basis, currently one every 1-2 months, with information specifically for groups and group members. Through responses to an initial survey the Sister Groups program was established, donated fabric was given to more groups for their charity quilts. On a positive note more groups have been sharing their news in I-Patch.

An application for an Older Persons Aging Well grant of \$8,850 was submitted in November on behalf of the Country Forum 2025 Team. The results of the application will be known in April 2025.

Several Help Sheets and Guideline documents have been created specifically for groups and distributed with newsletters and put on the SA Quilters website. A new survey was sent out in January 2025 asking for interest in a couple of new ideas.

It has been a busy and productive year for groups, many supporting their local communities through providing quilts, raffle quilts, sewn goods and fundraising. Congratulations on a successful 2024 and wishing all groups and their members an even better 2025.

Insurance

In 2024 there were 10 exhibitions, 1 Rural Roundup event and 2 retreats covered under the Group Events Insurance.

The insurance cover is not automatic. It must be applied for on the appropriate form and accompanied by a fee of \$50, at least 2 months before the event, so that, for example, displayed quilted items are covered in the event of damage or theft. Display items used to enhance the event are not covered. Limit of the cover is \$10,000 per item so if a quilt has been valued higher than this, then the extra value would be covered by the owner.

Questions are often asked about coverage for occasional visitors at group meetings or retreats. Anyone who attends any group planned event but is not a member, either of the group or SAQ, does so at their own risk. One of the benefits of Guild membership, either as an individual member or as a member of a financial affiliated group, is that

membership fees include insurance for quilting related activities.

The insurance policy covers Public/Products liability (\$20,000,000) which includes General Property (\$100,000), money in transit (up to \$6,000), Personal Accident for volunteers working in an official capacity (various benefits) and Associations Liability cover (\$1,000,000 in any one claim). Also covered are speakers at Guild meetings or group meetings (up to 50 speakers per annum in total) and tutors who do not have their own Public Liability cover. Tutors who do not have their own cover are charged a fee. There is a \$500 excess which applies in the event of a claim.

SA Quilters insurance is arranged through the services of a broker, who does not charge a fee for this service, and the underwriter is CGU Insurance.

The Pt Augusta exhibition in October was attended for a Judging Training exercise by Heather Ford, Carolyn Thurtell and Marett Hancox.

Also in October Jill, Carolyn, Marett and Gaylene, attended the Tea Tree Gully exhibition for a Judging training exercise.

The Judging Team really appreciates these training opportunities and would like to thank those groups who have asked for our assistance in the past and allowed us to attend their exhibition for training purposes.

We encourage group exhibition organisers to have their shows judged, using the voluntary services of our trained and experienced judges, to avoid problems that can arise from having untrained judges.

For SA Quilters to be able to ensure we have competent, confident, well-trained judges available for the Guild and its member group events, real training experiences in exhibitions is an essential part of our training program. So if your group is having an exhibition, please consider having the show judged. Should your exhibition not be judged, we would like the opportunity for our judging team to use it as a training exercise.

Thank you also to the members of the Judging Team and the Judges in Training for volunteering their time and expertise, and also their ongoing support.

Finally, an appeal to those quilters who have long overdue library books. After the AGM, we will be sending out invoices for the replacement cost of overdue books, so please check through your bookcase and return books as soon as possible.

With old books and categories potentially being removed, and new books on the way, I want to thank Jackie Harris and Christine, Baker for their support in the library, and to all of you for making our library a crazy but wonderful space to be in. My role as librarian is one that I really enjoy.

It has been my pleasure to be the Shop Liaison officer for SA Quilters for another year.

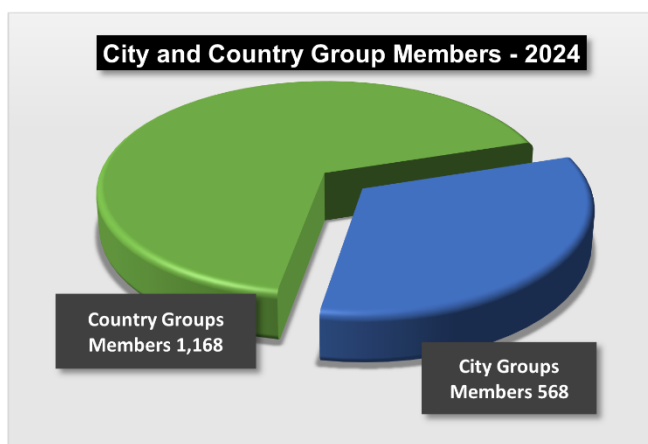
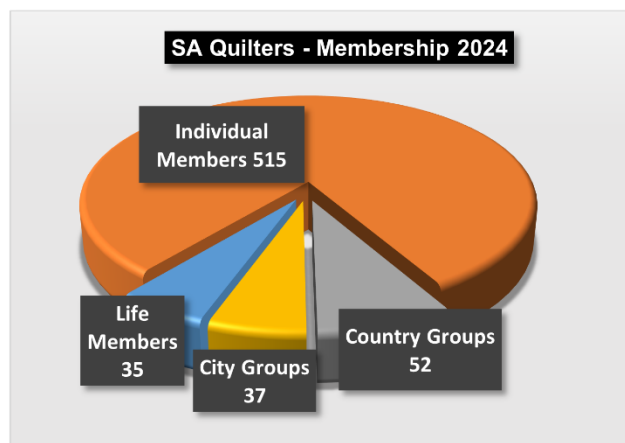

Modern Mix

This year at Modern Mix has been interesting, challenging and vital to the modern quilters of this group. Also on display were a number of quilts made and kindly lent by SA quilters using Sue’s quilt designs.

Quilt Encounter

The 32nd Annual Quilt Encounter was held at the Stamford Grand, Glenelg, from the 15th to the 20th of September. The event's theme was Dazzling Zebras.

9 tutors taught at Quilt Encounter (5 for the first time), presenting a variety of workshop options. Sue Spargo joined us from Ohio USA with her famous embroidery and felted wool work. Kathy Doughty and Lynne Wilson from New South Wales with some unique choices in traditional and modern styles. Christine Lethlean from Victoria taught textile art classes. Jan Hales from Victor Harbor presented a functional strip pieced bag. Jemima Flendt from Western Australia and Jen Kingwell from Victoria both provided some great workshop choices too. Added to this were two South Australian tutors - Rachelle Denny and Jacky Eyre. Lots of positive feedback was received throughout the event, most likely as a direct reflection of the great line-up of tutors we were able to present.

It was a full house at the Stamford Grand with 167 participants, 9 tutors and 10 committee members. The Team made some changes to our food options with the help of the hotel staff, and attendees provided positive feedback on this too.

Sunday night Opening Night was again a highlight, with Glyn Singleton (Managing Director of Bernina Australia) officially opening QE 2024. Tutors were introduced with their inspiring workshop samples, plus the Show and Tell from previous years' classes showcased the wonderful projects participants had completed.

We were grateful for the ongoing support QE received from our sponsors Bernina, Olfa, Melann's Fabrics as well as the wider quilting community and businesses. Bernina Australia have supported this event for 32 years and Christina from Melann's continues her valued sponsorship with the provision of Bernina hire machines for interstate students. This year 50% of attendees were from interstate (including 1 from New Zealand), so the

support given to them allowed us to provide a wider range of tutor options.

The two invited shops were also major sponsors with their tempting displays and provision of back up supplies for students. Our sincere thanks to Naomi from Nay's Place in Waikerie and Helen from The Quilting Room in Modbury Heights.

We also received wonderful support from the SA Quilters Leadership Team and community to help to stage this event and ensure that it continues to grow and maintain its nationwide reputation.

Each year participants receive a goody bag with donated items. Many of our participants like to share their own creativity by making various things to be included in the bags – so 180 much appreciated items were kindly made by each of them.

Dinner Night was again a huge success, with Zebras in various formats making their appearance. All Quilt Encounter sponsors were acknowledged and thanked for their generosity at our dinner. The major prize draw was a popular feature of the night.

The design of the raffle quilt, made by the Quilt Encounter Team, was inspired by the event theme with the \$5000 fundraising proceeds going to the Royal Flying Doctors Community Support program for SA/NT. The Stamford Grand Hotel provided a High Tea for Six and a beautiful quilt, created by previous attendees and beautifully put together by Sonia Holton, was also raffled.

The staff at the Stamford Grand Hotel were incredibly supportive. Kirsten and Kimberley from the Events Management Team provided guidance in the months leading up to QE, throughout the planning and preparation stages. Hotel staff were reliably on hand to assist us at every step.
