

The story behind "Chloe Word Quest" by Michael Barton

We met Chloe Turtle on two trips to Cairns turtle hospital over a year. She had been injured in a boating accident losing parts of three flippers. The second time we saw her she had healed and was soon to be released back into the ocean. A dramatic show of strength and survival.

My sister, Ruth, who lives in the United States, is a three times cancer survivor. The second cancer affected her immune system which started attacking her retinas instead of the cancer. Within 36 hours she lost 97% of her sight, followed by her award-winning career in theatre lighting and production, and the loss of independence in all areas of her life. Even though she was told at work she was so good she could do her job with her eyes closed, the outcome of being "retired" proved otherwise.

This quilt is for Ruth. A strong, independent woman who is a survivor, like Chloe, of many challenges in life not just cancer and being blind.

When you go into a quilt show there are signs all around saying "Do Not Touch". When you are blind you rely on touch in many new ways, i.e. using a cane so you can feel your path as you walk into your new life avoiding obstructions and dangerous obstacles; learning Braille so your fingers can read the words your eyes cannot see; using your hands and enhanced touch to keep you safe in the kitchen; to feel the skin of a friend for warmth and companionship; to feel the fur of your guide dog leading you safely along your way; feeling everyday objects and fabrics to enhance the quality of your life.

This quilt has been designed to be gently touched by sighted and visually impaired. The soft tactile fabrics guide you to suede patches and Braille words of inspiration. Slightly harsher fabrics may mean you are not heading in the right direction for words but there is always inspiration in the tactile feel of the fabrics.

We all benefit from these activities even if we personally don't attend as we get inspired by the work and skills of the presenters, and the people who attend bring back and share their new skills to inspire or improve our own quilting. We can't all produce a Tara or Zara quilt (Winners of 2025 FOQ) for many reasons, but it doesn't stop us admiring their beauty (even if it is just from photos) and learning ways to improve our own work from the experience.

I want to thank all who have built up and continue to support the SA Quilters community to help everyone grow in their love of quilting. The SA Quilters membership and affiliated groups are indebted to your contributions.

Rosanne Fuller - My story

I grew up in Parkside, an inner suburb of Adelaide in a house my great grandfather had built. I lived a very sheltered life, we could have been living remote and I think I would have felt more connected to the community. We didn't have a television until I brought one home during the holidays of my first permanent teaching job, or a telephone until I needed one to be able to be contacted when applying for teaching jobs. I remember our head gym coach sending a telegram to Mum from Glen Osmond to Parkside asking Mum to ring her. There was never any music or radio playing. The only connection with the outside world was via the Advertiser, and I wasn't going to sit around reading that. There was a lot of silence in our house. We rarely went out and socialised or played with other families.

I was the eldest of three children. My father was a civil and structural engineer, mother a draftsperson until she had me, then she stayed home; she is an artist. My brother studied architecture and my sister is an interior designer. I was very different to the rest of my family as I was a primary Physical Education teacher; felt like the black sheep. They were all into building design and being creative. I loved the kinaesthetic; needed to be moving.

I didn't go to kindergarten and Mum didn't let us go to the local primary school as she had gone there as a kid and it hadn't been a good experience for her, so she drove us to another school every day. When I was in Year 2, I used to catch the bus home as Mum had to pick up my brother early when he started school. Then when he went full time it was back to Mum picking us all up.

When I wasn't climbing trees, swinging on the clothesline or upside down doing handstands I joined the rest of the family in being crafty; sewing, doing tapestries, knitting. As a family, including Dad, we would sit around the fire knitting; we were always expected to be busy making.

I come from an artistic family. Living around creative people had built in an expectation that I be creative but my inherent nature to challenge everything or to be different tends to end up with some strange results. Not so much a product of beauty but something I had fun doing. I do appreciate and admire beauty as Mum would take us to art galleries. I didn't enjoy the creation of Mum's art when on family holidays we would stop in the middle of nowhere for her to sketch an old farm house or building with nothing for us to do other than knitting or tapestry.

I also joined in lots of sports, which is what you do when moving to the country and tried lots of other craft hobbies. I would try anything once and now have the supplies to go with it; spinning, card making, crocheting, paper making, dressmaking, tatting, embroidery, cross stitch, Tunisian knitting/crochet.



I am married with two adult children, our son who is working in architecture is living with us and has a partner. Our daughter is an Occupational Therapist and lives on the Gold Coast with her fur baby; there are no grandchildren on the horizon. Our children have both sets of their grandparents alive fit and well and still living in their own homes.

Since finishing my teacher training I have moved around a lot initially with teaching and then with my family, I have lived in more houses than I have UFOs; Murray Bridge, on the Eyre Peninsula, Ceduna, Whyalla and Port Augusta, remote Pipalyatjara, the Riverland in Berri (working in Loxton and Barmera), Broken Hill, in the Northern Territory in Alice Springs, Darwin and Nhulunbuy (working in remote communities) and in Adelaide.

I love living in the country and experiencing life in so many different regions, but it would have been cheaper to go on holiday than to shift all the time. The place I relate to most is Alice Springs; we moved there three times and both our children were born there.

My favourite animal is the tortoise, I have had a few as pets over the years. It started with a small toy I found on the gym floor who went on many adventures and got lost twice, once at high school it was thrown out a third storey window and I later found him pinned up on a notice board, another time I found him in on a lecture theatre floor in a pile of dirt, ready to be swept up.

I had to give away my last pet tortoises, as it was illegal to have them in the Northern Territory. We got CJ, a baby freshwater crocodile as a replacement pet and when he passed we got bearded dragons. I like retiles. We now have Dougie, a bearded dragon, two black silky bantams and a very anxious kelpie/border collie cross dog called Amber. We bought CJ while on holidays when passing though Katherine from a shop that had been a fish shop on our previous visit to Katherine!




The Lions Club of Quilters Victoria – two displays

This club had two fabulous displays: one was a selection of quilts from their "Australian Designer and Textile Collection", while the other was entitled "Our World Coming Together". This featured 75 quilts from overseas and Australian artists who answered the call to be part of the Lions Club of Quilters International Quilt Challenge in 2024. It includes works by a number of South Australians, but notably our 'stars': Julie Haddrick, Ann Head, Prue Wheal and Zara Zannettino. This exhibit by the group, consisting of Suzanne Gummow, Maxine Fry, Kerrie Head and Jenny Bates, captured "A Moment in Time" with their cameras. They subsequently experimented and challenged themselves to create their works differently to anything they had done before. They created a brilliant display of varied works (pictured below).



Entries

While entries were initially slow to come in, which caused some anxious moments for the Committee, we finished with 171 entries (from 97 entrants), of which nine were for 'display only'. There were two entries from our male members, both of which won prizes and five junior entries.

Awards

Congratulations go to all the prize winners – the work displayed this year was amazing. You have to be in it to win it, they say, and that was certainly the case this year. Shelley Page was a first-time entrant and entered five quilts, of which she won four awards. We look forward to seeing more of her quilts at future Festivals.

Best of Show was won by Tara Sniedze, with her beautiful hand needle turned appliqué quilt "Lily Rosenberry Revisited", which was exquisitely hand quilted. When this was announced at the Awards Presentation, Tara was quite overcome with emotion, as this was her first Best of Show award. Tara said: "I never thought it possible to compete against the amazing machine quilters".

The Best of Show Runner Up was awarded to Zara Zannettino for her innovative quilt, "The Invisible Connection", which was all about genetics, clearly showing Zara's microbiology background.



A bright and colourful work, it was a great contrast to Tara's traditional piece, which were showcased at the entrance to the Festival.

Zara was also our fabulous *Quilter in Residence* where one could see her at work and gain valuable insights and advice about her styles and techniques.

Lots to See and Do....Demonstrations, "Make and Take" Sessions, Workshops, Catwalk Parade

If you haven't been to a CraftAlive/Festival of Quilts event, I thoroughly recommend that you try to attend next year. There is so much to see, to do and to learn. Many of the stall holders had "make and take" sessions and demonstrations. There were lots of quilting suppliers and there were also workshops run by CraftAlive. This year, there was a 'catwalk' parade every day, where crafters could showcase their work, which ranged from clothes, to bags, to quilts. Five \$50 vouchers were awarded each day, to spend anywhere within CraftAlive. It was a lot of fun and great to see a couple of guys participate with their zany clothes.

The Festival of Quilts featured three simultaneous **demonstrations**, twice a day, offering the following:

Speed Dating with Rulers Modern Quilting
Hand Quilting Fusion quilting

English Paper Piecing Foundation Paper Piecing

Reverse Applique Eppiflex (piecing using acetate shapes)

Wool Felt Embroidery Perfect Binding

Each of our judges, Julie Adamson, Jill Christian and Bronwyn Savage gave a *Judge's Floor Talk* and those who attended said they learnt so much and found the talks really interesting. The judges explained what they look for and gave an insight into the things to which we should pay attention when making our next quilt, even if it's not for judging.

The quilt consists of cotton, velvet, poly fur, embroidery, plastic and has braille written in metal rivets. The words inscribed are: Chloe Turtle Quest; And though she be little, she is fierce (*Shakespeare*); Say yes to your dreams; Choose hope; Shine; Be kind or be quiet; Love is love; Vision is more than sight, write your own story; Joy Peace Hugs; Breathe mindful laughter.

Michael and Ruth (who lives in the United States) attended the quilt every day of the Festival of Quilts. They were thrilled to be able to tell their story, but the most important thing to them was hearing the stories from other 'survivors' from different issues, as well as children with ADHD with touch issues and old people in nursing homes communicating by touch. 2025 Festival of Quilts Judging and Floor Talk by Julie Adamson

It was a pleasure and a privilege to judge the 2025 Festival of Quilts along with South Australian judges, Jill Christian and Bronwyn Savage. I congratulate Ann Ewer and her exhibition committee for a fabulous exhibition. They are a well organised, hard-working team and all the hard work certainly paid off.

Judging day ran very smoothly and Jill, Bronwyn and I soon established a good working rhythm. Both Jill and Bronwyn were lovely to work with, thank you Ladies. The judging room team calmly kept everything running smoothly.

Each category is judged and with an outcome of a 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Whilst we go through this process, we must also keep our eye out for any quilt we believe may be a contender for special awards, such as machine quilting or embellishments etc. This is where the team really help with prompts reminding us at the end of each category if there are any quilts we want put aside for consideration for special awards.

All first-place quilts go into a pile for the final judging for the Best of Show quilt, which is done after all categories have been judged and special awards allocated.

Each judge is asked to do a floor talk on one of the days of the exhibition. I like to do a few walks around the exhibition before my talk. This particular layout had a really good flow. Demonstration areas were placed throughout the display and not just in one corner, or up against a back wall. This added a lot of interest and change throughout the three days.

I have been coming to Festival of Quilts exhibitions for more than 15 years and South Australian quilters never fail to deliver a wide variety of beautiful quilts in a wide range of styles and techniques.

Interestingly, of the approximately 160 quilts that were judged, 26 were hand quilted. The high standard of hand quilting ranged from fine stitching to bolder or larger stitching that were appropriate for the overall design of each quilt.

The machine quilting of both domestic and long arm was also of a very high standard.

Modern quilts, again, had a wonderful showing. It was great to see one of these modern quilters successfully use much older fabrics to create her quilt. (I'm pretty sure I recognise one of these fabrics from about 20 years ago).

One of the criteria's that I look for when judging Art or Art/abstract quilts is that the quilt should evoke some emotion. The quilts in these categories certainly did that....with some of the quilter's statements adding an extra layer to the overall experience.

There were 28 first time entrant quilts. This is a great number and an excellent indicator of a growing and healthy Guild.

In any exhibition it's often a simple, well executed quilt that is most photographed and talked about, not necessarily the big winners. Or the unexpected, like Michael's quilt that he made for his sister Ruth. This quilt and the story behind it had such an impact on so many people who visited the quilt show.

We make quilts because we love it. We make what we love, in the colours and fabrics that we choose. As a group we share our skills and tips freely with others. So, if you haven't before, then think about sharing your work by exhibiting. If you are making a quilt to exhibit, do the best you can and take time with finishing and eye to detail. Not only will you have the pleasure of seeing your quilt hanging with others under the lights, but you just might win a prize.


