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Quilt Encounter 2025

The 33rd Annual Quilt Encounter has wrapped up with very happy responses from our attendees this year. A reflection of all the work put in by the QE team, our shops and the great line-up of tutors this year. This was our 6th year at the Stamford Grand with 164 participants, and 34 first timers coming from around Australia. The Stamford Grand staff continue to welcome us back and genuinely look forward to our event each year despite all the cotton threads on the carpets.

This year we had two new local tutors teaching at Quilt Encounter for the first time, presenting new workshop options for our participants as well as eight fabulous tutors who have taught at QE previously. Wendy Williams (NSW) joined us with her fabulous embroidery and felted wool work. Wendy's Ollies fish cushion class an instant favourite able to be improv or pieced and a cushion or a quilt. Kathy Doughty (NSW) returned again this year, her Soul Searching class in high demand as it took students out of their comfort zone to consider colour, tone, scale and texture. Lynne Wilson taught a great fat quarter stash buster quilt and how to make a By Annie Duffel bag. Christine Lethlean (Vic) returned to teach two Textile Art classes, one hand project and one machine project. These are stunning art

works and one lucky QE went home with one of Christine's pieces she had donated to our major prize draw. Jodi Godfey taught three English paper piecing projects. Jodi's students were happy but so was Jodi giving a fabulous review on her Instagram page Tales of cloth https://www.instagram.com/talesofcloth/

Michelle Marvig (NSW) taught her new Whirling Pinwheels quilt pattern and templates, and two classes using classic designs Dresden plate and Mariners compass with a twist. Great projects to use up the stash.

SA quilt icon and treasure Rachelle Denneny is always popular at QE teaching her Little Moments quilt. Rachelle's mystery classes is always oversubscribed, this year was no different. Heather Hopkins (SA) 2 day class on machine quilting produced some amazing quilting by the participants and they were all really keen to have her back next year. Our first time tutors were two locals. Alli Phillips (SA) experiencing this event for the first time, presented a beautiful, practical sewing journal cover part of her range of practical projects to keep your sewing organised and looking gorgeous. Allison Watts (SA) taught a two day Sashiko class that was an absolute student favourite. Starting with a single stitch Allison shared her indepth understanding of Japanese culture and Sashiko.

Sunday night Opening Night was again a highlight, with Glyn Singleton (Managing Director of Bernina Australia) Officially Opening QE 2024. Introduction of our tutors with all their inspiring workshop samples, plus the Show and Tell from previous years' classes is always great to see. The returning tutors were so delighted to see what they had inspired in students work.

We are very grateful to the individuals and businesses who choose to support Quilt Encounter through Sponsorship and of course SA Quilters. There are so many wonderful sponsors who support QE providing so much – from the Goody Bag items to prizes for our Major Prize Draw and you can download a full list of 2025 sponsors from the QE website page

The winner Grace Di Muzio from Victoria with her piece titled GODDESS.







Thread Pods Workshop with Wendy Williams

SA Quilters recently hosted a wonderful workshop titled *Thread Pods*, tutored by the talented interstate tutor, **Wendy Williams**.

The workshop attracted 20 participants, including three first-time attendees who were warmly welcomed into the group. We were especially pleased to acknowledge three ladies who travelled from afar – two from the Yorke Peninsula and one from Hawker – showing the wide appeal of Wendy's teaching.

Wendy guided everyone through this delightful hand-embroidered project, which focused on simple and achievable stitching techniques. Her clear instructions and creative inspiration encouraged participants to try new ideas and enjoy the relaxing pace of handwork.

All participants were well looked after by our four workshop angels – Ros, Peg, Jill and Wendy –who kept everyone supplied with hot beverages throughout the day. Morning and afternoon tea were also provided, adding to the warm and welcoming atmosphere.

The workshop was both enjoyable and rewarding, leaving participants inspired to continue working on their *Thread Pods* and to explore more hand embroidery in the future.

Workshop Report: Desert Sky Foundation Paper Piecing with Elizabeth Chadwick

SA Quilters most recent Workshop was Desert Sky a Quiltworx Foundation Paper Piecing pattern tutored by Elizabeth Chadwick.

14 students attended this creative workshop and throughout the day Elizabeth provided constant individual support ensuring everyone received guidance tailored to their project.

Elizabeth demonstrated different techniques and tips that were very helpful. By the end of the workshop, every participant had mastered the technique of Foundation Paper Piecing — which involves sewing fabric to a foundation of paper that has preprinted lines and sewing instructions. This allows for perfect points and seam allowances. In the workshop the techniques covered by the students were floating points, cutting techniques, curved piecing and stacking techniques. Even the experienced quilters went home with some newly learnt techniques.

Such was the enthusiasm in the room that participants barely paused for refreshment breaks and stayed stitching at their machines until it was time to pack up. The term – you could hear a pin drop certainly applied in this workshop everyone was eager to get on with their projects.

Our workshop angels kept everyone refreshed with tea, coffee and a delicious morning tea.

A big thank you to Elizabeth for her expert teaching, and to all who attended for making it such a warm and rewarding day of learning.

Any day spent quilting is enjoyable – but a day spent quilting with friends is priceless.

Biggest Morning Tea

Port Elliot Patchworkers (PEP) held their Biggest Morning Tea on 23 September 2025. The venue was decorated with a mix of modern and older style quilts. Penny from PennyLane Patchwork set up a colourful shop of gorgeous fabrics, patterns and notions, and guests enjoyed a scrumptious morning tea.

A huge thank you to our guest speaker, Rosanne Fuller, newly appointed President for SA Quilters and also very new to the world of quilting. We knew we would be in for a treat when Rosanne donned her talking hat. She took us on a journey of how her normal life was changed dramatically by ill health and led her to quilting and then the huge step of volunteering to be the President of SAQ.

Rosanne's talk came from the heart and was truly touching and inspiring. Her story was interspersed with many unique samples of her quilting where she happily uses op shop finds and old clothing alongside quilting fabrics. She claims she missed out on the creative gene compared to her parents and siblings but we didn't see that – we saw her unique style and her enthusiasm for having a go.



PEP organised a selection of shoe box raffles which included two quilts, lucky door and chair prizes. The quilts were made with "challenge" blocks between PEP and Yankalilla Threads. The Threads challenge in 2024 was for us to make black and white squares which they sewed into two quilts and then generously gifted one to PEP. Goolwa Patchers also joined the PEP challenge in 2023 (Fleurieu) by donating extra-large blocks that worked perfectly for the top and bottom rows and which PEP then turned into a quilt.

Woodpatch Quilters 40th Anniversary

Adelaide Hills Quilting group Woodpatch Quilters recently held an Exhibition at Verdun Hall. The Exhibition theme was "40 Years of Threads of Friendship". Around 100 quilts and other textile items were on display in the Exhibition, with about 90 items eligible for "Viewers Choice" voting awards. Revisited Featured Quilter

In the lead up to Suzanne Gummow's Lace Flowers Workshop on Saturday 18 October and Saturday 8 November, we thought we would dive into the archives and revisit Suzanne's Featured Quilter article from I-Patch June 2021.



1950's – 1960's: I grew up in Adelaide, South Australia. It all started innocently enough as a child. I developed a desire for all things creative from a very early age and so began a life long interest in art, textiles, painting and drawing. Sewing was another pastime, learned from my great aunt who was keen to foster in me traditional skills of dressmaking, embroidery, knitting and crochet. My earliest memory was sewing by hand a doll's dress to fit my 1950's 22" doll. My mother was alarmed one day when she found her six-year-old sitting in the



bath, knitting. When she asked what on earth was I doing and why, I explained that I did not want to waste time. I haven't changed much at all since then. As long as I can remember I have been driven to create.

Early 1960s—Suzanne's first machine

From about the age of ten I made most of my clothes. From then on I became a "textile junkie', buying, collecting and fondling fabrics. I continued to make most of my clothes and in my teenage years, to the horror of my mother who wondered why I had bought curtain fabric of lime green and black 3" squares to make pants, it was because I could and I had lime green platform shoes to match. What a look – well it was the 1960's!

My grandfather introduced me to the world of art and we visited Art Galleries and Museums. To increase my knowledge and understanding I immersed myself in art and textiles to feed my growing thirst and curiosity. As time passed I wondered how to integrate these creative endeavors with a career.

In the late 1960's I took my first trip overseas to Fiji discovering two things; one that I love travelling and the second was a love of the Indian and Asian fabrics that I found in the markets there. Travelling has continued to be a huge part of my life, providing inspiration for my artwork and another total obsession.

1970's – 1980's: I enrolled at the South Australian School of Art to train as a Secondary Art Teacher and midway through this study I was introduced to textiles as an art form and the realization came to me that I could pass this passionate interest onto others. I had truly passed the point of no return – I was hooked on all things related to textiles, with my "fabricolism and threadmania" extremely evident. After completing a Diploma and Bachelor of Teaching in Fine Arts, specializing in Textiles I have continued a 50 year teaching career in secondary education and barely paused for minor distractions such as marriage and the birth of two boys.









1990's – 2010's - Every few years I have felt the need to extend myself and experiment with new techniques and ideas, so in the early 1990's I undertook a Certificate course at the Embroiderers' Guild where I specialized in surface stitchery—both machine and handwork—and piece work, exploring applique, patchwork and quilting. In this course I learnt the foundations of traditional quilt making and embroidery. I believe strongly that the traditions are the "backbone" of any textiles, whether traditional or contemporary in style. It was at this point that I joined the SA Quilters Guild and I knew there was no returning to a life without quilting. Things have never looked back. Hooked I was: quilting, quilting and more quilting, starting with the traditional styles to learn the basics and then onto my Art Quilts of today. Also at this point I took on the role of Convenor of "Dare to Differ" a contemporary quilt exhibition, which is held every two years.

In the early 2000's I undertook Post Graduate and Masters in Education, Asian Studies specializing in textiles – these were all turning points in my career. During these years I wrote many articles on textiles for Australian magazines which I loved; I think it was the research for these articles that I loved the most.

Side by side with all this formal and non formal education came the creating as an artist – solo and group exhibitions both nationally and overseas, shop sales and more. I continued to learn even more about textiles by attending workshops. I taught at Marden Senior College in Adelaide where I initiated, developed and wrote the curriculum and lectured in these nationally accredited Certificates in Art Textiles. What a job!!





2015

2020's - Retirement from full time teaching occurred at the end of 2020 and a new life began. Teaching is still in my blood and I thrive on being able to pass on this wealth of knowledge and understanding of textiles that I have acquired over the years to other people in various ways. Now is the time to work out how to do this; workshops, blogs, Youtube videos - who knows what the future will hold. Obviously more OS travelling when we can but in the meantime, Australia here we come!
